PRINEVILLE SECOND PLACE FOR BIGGS CUP

Prineville took second place in the contest for the Biggs Cup, which was held at Madras on Saturday night. Bend scored 90.2 and Prineville 89.5. The loss of one of the members of the Prineville team just a few days prior to the contest put the kibosh on Prineville's perfect work, though the local team almost won in spite of this. Nearly every Odd Fellow from Ochoco Lodge was able to go over, and nearly 300 members of the order were present.

EXCITING STUNTS
