FORESTRY NOTES
Despite the fact that financial conditions are anything but satisfactory with the livestock business, local stockmen are going ahead with their business in anticipation of the return of normal and better conditions. The fact too, that range conditions are better this season than they have been for a good many years past gives new hope to the fellow who is striving to make a go of it, and the pessimism that would ordinarily be present with economic conditions such as they are is not generally in evidence. Reports from all quarters within and adjacent to the Ochoco Forest indicate that a lot of beef will be ready for the market directly from the open range by July 1 to 15. One of the leading wool growers of this section of the state made the remark a few days ago that he had never before seen such fat sheep or such excellent wool at this season of the year.
Ranger W. A. Donnelly and S. C. Congleton, assisted by John Dobry will complete today (Thursday) a telephone line connecting big summit prairie with Paulina. The new line parallels the road which is now under construction between these two points.
It is reported that one of the recent waterspouts in this locality did a lot of damage to the road within the Forest on Mill Creek. The road had just been repaired and put in better condition than it had ever been before when the waterspout came. Messrs. Chas. Glasgow and Chas. Merry are now working on this road and have the upper end of it completed to within a half a mile of the main summit. Within two or three weeks it should be possible to go by road to Divide Ranger Station on the summit of the mountain. This station will be occupied by S. W. Babcock during the fire season, from which point he will work the two lookout points adjacent, viz; Hash Rock and Tamarac Point.
Messrs. Lee Blevis, J. E. Wilson and E. D. Sandvig are now busily engaged in improving the road up Canyon Creek toward Summit Prairie from the Ochoco Highway, and particularly that portion on the west slope of the mountain. An entirely new road will be constructed over more than half of the distance up the steep part of the mountain, and the maximum grade when the road is completed will be approximately 11 per cent, which will be a great improvement over the old road which was double this percent or 22 per cent at one of the steep pitches generally known as a "resting place" for fords.
Ranger E. W. Donnelly, assisted by Messrs. Cy Kimmell, Judd Lytle, Eugene Miller and Richard Helms, has just completed 5 1-2 miles of new telephone line between Allison Ranger Station and the main line which serves the section about Suplee. The line will now be extended south from Allison Ranger Station to Black Butte before July 1, and immediately thereafter another line of 18 miles will be constructed on towards Burns, to connect with a new line to be built by the Malheur Forest. When this system is completed, the Ochoco and Malheur Forests will be in a position to co-operate very much more closely than ever before in a fire protection and administrative way.
Ranger Ralph Elder, who received instruction from Portland to report for Airplane patrol for fire protection, has been advised that he will not be needed this season on account of the substitution of another ranger whose physical condition would not permit him to continue with the work of the average ranger in the field, but whose ability to fill the position as a pilot for airplane patrol service had not been impaired. This is certainly good news to the Ochoco, since a lot of work had been planned for Ranger Elder's district for the season and the local administration had been hard put to find a means to accomplish the work with the loss of Mr. Elder.
Ranger Blake, with the assistance of W. E. Bennett and Matt Asher, is reconstructing his pasture fence at Beaver Ranger Station, also building about two miles of telephone line, burning accumulated brush at the station as the result of wood cutting, etc., and doing numerous other improvement jobs about his headquarters, which will greatly increase the attractiveness of the place. During the year, it is expected that the station barn, wood-shed, and other buildings will be stained with the regulation bungalow brown color, a new yard fence constructed which will extend out and front the new highway just completed, an addition made to the station house in the form of a new kitchen and bathroom and other improvement jobs too numerous to mention.
