A FEw Questions Propounded and Answered.

For the information of many distant readers of The Review, informa-desirous of getting reliable information about this district, the following questions are answered correctly and honestly as possible:

Question-Where is St. Johns? Answer-In Multnomah County, Oregon, 10 miles north of Portland.

Q .- What is the population? A .- Over 2000 people,

Q .- Is it on the ocean ?

A .- No, it is located by the Columbia and Willamette rivers. The peninsula is 12 miles long by about three miles wide.

Q .- Are the rivers navigable? A .- Yes; the channels are from 40 to 100 feet deep, and the largest ships that float come from all parts of the world and may load and anload cargoes at the docks.

Q .- Are there any railroads? A .- Yes; an electric road to Portland, and the O. R. & N., a part of the Southern Pacific system, traverses the water front for several miles, and the Northern Pacific is on the opposite side of the Willamette river.

Q .- What lines of business are there?

A .- See the advertising columns of this paper.

Q.-Is business overdone? A .- No; there is room for more substantial business houses,

Q .-- What supports the town? A .- The large mills and factories.

There are three sawmills, one veneer factory, one box and basket factory, two shipbuilding yards, one large dry dock, one porch and column factory, one flour mill, one woolen mill, and several other smaller factories,

Q .- What is the pay roll? -About \$25,000 per month. A.

Q .- How about school and church privileges?

A .- One large school house (the second one contemplated) and three churches. The university is about a mile from St. Johns.
