**THE CITY ELECTION!**

**A Spirited Contest Marked by a Reign of Absolute Peace and Good Feeling.**

Monday was a busy day in St. Johns. When the matin song of the blue birds were heard men began to stir, restlessly, in their sleep, and when the first sun beams shot over the snowy peaks of the Cascades, men were tumbling pell-mell into the streets, full of determination to leave no stone unturned to secure the election of their candidate.

On every street corner, in every business house, groups of men could be seen talking excitedly, and the burden of their conversation was the election. No other theme presented itself for discussion, or if it did, it was side-tracked as being unworthy of attention on the day of all days.

When the polls opened at 9 o'clock, the various tickets were represented by men to look after their interests. The flow of perspiration flowed along in rippling currents until the tide was full. Nothing occurred to annoy the voters. Discussions often grew animated but never angry. A spirit of good fellowship filled the air, the advocates of each ticket being confident of victory.

As the hours passed slowly by people came from Portland to witness the struggle.

Artists and reporters from the great dailies of the metropolis were in evidence. The plastic pencil of Murphy of the Oregonian produced life-like sketches of the various candidates. The historian, McCulley, perspired freely as he recorded the discovery of St. Johns. Mr. McCulley is entitled to great credit for his discovery; but he is entitled to more praise for the manly statement that, while he had just discovered Johns he had also discovered the future that lies before it, and the city which it will be in that not distant, future.

The total vote cast at the election was 374.

**ELECTION NOTES.**

The good government ticket was elected throughout, with the exception of mayor and one councilman at large.

Mr. King's plurality was 20, Monahan and Jobs being tied for second place.

P. J. Peterson received the highest number of votes of any of the candidates for councilmen.

It was nip-and-tuck between Shields and Hall in the second ward, the former winning out by one vote.

Judge Greene, for city attorney, had a walkover—no opposition. The Judge has announced his intention of resigning and leaving the mayor free to make his own selection. The reason for this is the misunderstanding of the charter provisions.

Mayor-elect King was given an enthusiastic ovation after the votes had been counted and the result announced. The M. W. A. band turned out and serenaded the new chief executive.

There were many disappointed candidates, of course, and perhaps a few sore spots left, but time is a wonderful healer. With the last ballot dropped in the box, all animosities and ill feeling should have disappeared, and every voter resolved to give loyal support to the men elected.

The newly-elected city officers met at the city hall, Wednesday, for the discussion of matters in general, and with the view of getting better acquainted before entering upon their duties next Monday evening.

The new city officers will meet next Monday evening, when they will be sworn in and assume the reins of city government.
