strong as it might be, I think it heavy enough to throw a stream over any building in town. Unfortunately for the water company there are no hills in Saint Johns, and we cannot get pressure unless we build elevated tanks, and this is what we are preparing to do.

"Do we wish to sell the plant?" Well, we have offered it to the city of Saint Johns for what it has cost us. We have expended \$30,000 and will sell it for that amount. At present the plant does not pay. If we keep the plant a number of years and get it on a paying basis it will not be for sale. Operating a water system is a business proposition, and should be treated as such. Again I repeat we are trying to keep up to the requirements of the town, and think we are doing so.

"Have we any kicks to make?" Possibly one or two. However, we are not complaining.
