Dog License.

Attention of owners of dogs is called to Section 6, of Ordinance 49, which is as follows:

"All dogs more than four months old found within the limits of the city of St. Johns without a license tag thereon are hereby declared to be a public nuisance, and any person or inhabitant of the city of St. Johns without first having paid the license required by this ordinance and having the number thereof stamped or engraved thereon on the collar of such dog as hereinbefore provided, or who shall cause or permit a collar and number to be put on a dog with intent to avoid payment of license therefor, shall, upon conviction for such offense before the municipal court, be subject to a fine of not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars, or imprisonment not less than five, nor more than twenty-five days."

THE REVIEW prints this section of the ordinance for the benefit of those owners of dogs who seem to have gotten the opinion that it is not necessary to have the license tag fastened to the dog. Owners should recognize this as a necessity as dog catchers cannot keep track of, and recognize, all dogs licensed. When the marshal finds a dog with no tag on the collar he will impound it; hence, if you wish to avoid trouble for yourself, and discomfort for your dog, and annoyance for the officials, owners should see that each dog carries a collar and tag tag legally secured.

Business Firm Dissolves.

The roof-painting firm of Moe & Clark, after a very busy career of a couple of months, has quit doing business as a firm. C. T. Moe will probably continue in the same business—while W. G. Clark is at present working for the government across the river. He is as yet undecided as to which of the several lines he has followed in the past he will adopt—but he intends to remain in the city as a resident.
