POOL, BACK YARDS!

An inquiry from one of the residents of the Park to the city health officer elicited the fact that the epidemic of diphtheria is due largely to the foul condition of the outhouses. With the advent of the rainy season and the consequent loosening of the soil, the fumes arise with a deadly effect. Decayed vegetable matter which has lain all summer, will, after a hard rain, begin to rot and it is not at all surprising that disease is the result. In one case where the patient, a child of about seven years, died, there is in the yard an open cess-pool and an outhouse which hasn't been cleaned in the last two years—possibly longer.

We had a number of diphtheria cases last year. This season, therefore, is not an exception, although the cases seem more numerous and fatal. It is not the fault of the weather, but of the unsanitary condition of the playgrounds which the little ones frequent most. One of our physicians is authority for the statement that if a hole be dug twenty feet away from the average outhouse of the Park, the stench could be plainly detected.

Under such conditions we are confronted with a grave epidemic each year unless something be done—and that at once. Chloride of lime generously sprinkled around will aid wondrously in driving the offensive odors—but a more permanent remedy is essential.
