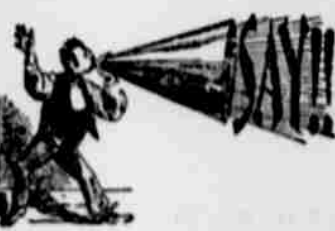

### A Suggestion.

Dr. L. M. Hensel submits the following suggestions for the trustees of the public schools which are well-worth heeding:

## ORDINANCE NO. 57

An Ordinance to Protect the Public from Neglect or Failure to Perform Their Duty by those Owning or Operating Franchises.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.—No person, firm or corporation owning, controlling or operating any franchise under or by virtue of any law or ordinance of the City of St. Johns, nor any officer, stockholder, agent or employee thereof, shall fail, neglect or refuse to perform any duty or service required by the public under the said franchise or the law or ordinance granting the same.

SECTION 2.—Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Municipal Court of the City of St. Johns, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not less than three days nor more than thirty days, in the City Jail, or by both such fine and imprisonment; and each day of maintaining and continuing such violation shall be deemed a separate offense and punished accordingly.

## RESOLUTION

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Council of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, held on the 6th day of November, A. D. 1905, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, That the Council of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, do hereby appoint and propose to improve John Street from the north line of Jersey street to the south line of Modoc street in the following manner, to wit:

To establish the necessary grade for paving and to improve said John street, lay side walks, grade, etc. Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of St. Johns, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns. The cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property specially and peculiarly benefited thereby and which is hereby declared to be all the lots, parts thereof, and parcels of land within a line 100 feet from the outside line of each side of said John street.

The Engineer's estimate of the probable total cost for the improvement of said street is \$1060.81.

The plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer for the improvement of said John street are hereby adopted.

RESOLVED, That the City Recorder of the City of St. Johns, be, and is, hereby directed to give notice of the proposed improvement of said John street as provided by this charter.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the undersigned within 15 days from the date of the first publication of this notice. By order of the council. J. W. HANKS, City Recorder. Published in the St. Johns Review November 10, 17 and 24, 1905.

## ORDINANCE NO. 58

An Ordinance to Protect Grade and Other Stakes Set by the City Engineer.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.—No person shall injure, remove or in any manner disturb any monument or stake or other marking set by the City Engineer in his official capacity.

SECTION 2.—Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction in the Municipal Court of the City of St. Johns, be fined not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars for each and every violation of this Ordinance.
