

RESOLVED: That the Council of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, deems it expedient and proposes to improve Pittsburg street from the Willamette River to the southerly line of Crawford street in the following manner: To establish the necessary grade for paving and to improve said Pittsburg street, lay side walks, grade, etc. Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of St. Johns, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Johns. The cost of said improvement from the Willamette river to the westerly side line of Bradford street to be paid by the St. Johns Ferry Company and the balance of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property specially and peculiarly benefited thereby and which is hereby declared to be all the lots, parts thereof, and parcels of land within a line 100 feet from the outside line of each side of said Pittsburg street.

The Engineer's estimate of the probable total cost for the improvement of said street is \$571.48.

The plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer for the improvement of said Crawford street are hereby adopted.

RESOLVED: That the City Recorder of the City of St. Johns be, and is, hereby directed to give notice of the proposed improvement of said Pittsburg street as provided by the city charter.
