ORDINANCE NO 68

An Ordinance Authorizing The Mayor And Recorder To Make A Contract For The Better Lighting Of The City Of St. Johns.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The mayor and city recorder of the City of St. Johns are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to enter into a contract in the name of said City of St. Johns with the Portland General Electric Company for the period of five years from and after this date for the placing and maintenance of eight additional alternating current enclosed arc electric lights of fourteen hundred candle power each, at places heretofore agreed upon by the council of said city, to be paid for monthly at the rate of five and 30-100 dollars (\$5.30) per calendar month for each of said arc lamps, and in accordance with the terms of the contract heretofore submitted to the council of said city by said Portland General Electric Company.

ORDINANCE NO. 67

An Ordinance Providing For The Appointment Of A Deputy Recorder For The City Of St. Johns, And Fixing His Compensation.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.—The Recorder of the City of St. Johns is hereby authorized to appoint a Deputy City Recorder for the unexpired portion of his term of office, who shall have all the powers provided by the Charter of said City.

SECTION 2.—The compensation of said Deputy City Recorder shall be \$40 per month during said term; to be paid as other official salaries are paid in said City of St. Johns.
