The Council of the City of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Salem street from the northernly line of Crawford street to the westernly line of Burlington street in said City of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of Council of record and date January 8, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published at St. Johns, for three consecutive weeks, from January 12, 1906, to January 26, 1906, inclusive, as shown by affidavit of the foreman of said paper on file, and the legal posting of notice of such street improvement as shown by affidavit of City Engineer on file with City Recorder, (no remonstrance having been filed), as provided by resolution of January 8, 1906, the sum of \$699.76 being City Engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost, but to be more accurately determined by the City Engineer.
