## WORDS OCCUPY TIME.

### Council Spends Considerable Time But Does Some Business For The City.

All members of the council were present when Mayor King called that body to order Wednesday evening.

An ordinance giving the O. R. & N. Company the right to lay and maintain 2052 feet of side track was read the first and second times. The franchise is a perpetual one, and governs Bradford street.

An ordinance to improve Leavitt street, and another to improve Ivanhoe street, passed first, second and third readings. These are published this week.

M. F. Loy withdrew his bid for the improvement of Thompson, Lively and Catlin streets—because the engineer's estimates were too low, and he feared trouble in collecting for the work. The engineer was ordered to prepare new estimates and then the call for bids will be republished.

A. R. Richardson, of Portland, asked if the city was willing to give him a franchise for a gas plant. He was told that he should prepare such an ordinance as he desired and when that should be presented to the council the feeling of that body could be quickly ascertained.

A belief seemed to exist that the committee appointed to revise the city charter was composed of grafters who were liable to hold up the city. A motion was made that the "committee work without any reimbursement" was made and seconded—but it was killed by a vote of five to two. The idea of pay for the month's work had not been entertained by any of the committee—and the motion was believed by many to have been uncalled for. As the matter now stands there is a strong probability that the committee could secure pay—if it desired to put in a bill for services rendered.

An ordinance was ordered drawn by the city attorney for the improving of Monteith street which seems to have been lost some time ago in the shuffle. This will be presented at the next meeting of the council.

The matter of the infringement of the state law prohibiting minors frequenting billiard halls and bowling alleys was discussed—and the attorney was ordered to draw an ordinance under which the city police could act in a legal manner. Adjourned to Tuesday evening, March 13.

### Round The Loop

Heretofore there has always been trouble for those people who live between Northern Hill and St. Johns on the north track—because it has been impossible for them to ride home except by paying two fares: one fare to Northern Hill and one from that point to their home. This has been very unsatisfactory—and most people chose rather to walk home.

S. C. Cook saw a chance to make a ten-strike, and opened correspondence with F. I. Fuller, of the railway. To him he stated the case as it was and showed the benefit to be derived by transfers from Northern Hill to points along the north side of the loop.

In response to this appeal Mr. Cook received the following communication from the railway officials:—"Replying to yours of February 26, regarding the establishment of a transfer point at Northern Hill so that people at St. Johns or on the south side of the loop can transfer to points on the north side of the loop, I beg to say that we have directed, that this matter be arranged, and we presume it will be inaugurated as soon as the necessary instructions are issued to the car men."

Mr. Cook made a very shrewd move in the matter—he saw the opportunity—and improved it.

### Sold Real Estate.

The building occupied by Poff & Carey was sold yesterday through the agency of Shepard, Dobie & Peterson. The consideration was named at \$4,500.

The Council of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, do hereby order that the cost of improving Leavitt street from the Northern line of Hayes street to the Southern line of Jersey street, in the City of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of council of record and date February 21, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published in St. Johns, for three (3) consecutive weeks from February 28 to March 2, 1906, inclusive, as shown by affidavit of the foreman of said paper on file; and the legal posting of notices of such street improvement as shown by affidavit of the city engineer on file with city recorder in accordance with resolution of council of record and date February 14, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published in St. Johns, for three (3) consecutive weeks from February 15 to March 2, 1906, inclusive, as shown by affidavit of the foreman of said paper on file; and the legal posting of notices of such street improvement as shown by affidavit of the city engineer on file with city recorder in accordance with resolution of council of record and date February 14, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published in the said City of St. Johns, Oregon, inviting proposals for making said improvements, and said sum, as estimated by the city engineer as cost thereof, or such sum as shall finally be fixed and determined by city engineer not exceeding said sum, is hereby assessed to the lots, parts of lots and tracts in their several proportions in the assessment district of said Leavitt street from the Northern line of Hayes street to the Southern line of Jersey street, in the said City of St. Johns, in the respective amounts to be hereafter determined and assessed to said lots, parts of lots, and tracts as being benefited by said street improvements, heretofore declared and now designated as all the lots, parts thereof and parcels of land within a line 100 feet from the outside line of each side of said Leavitt street.

The Recorder is hereby directed to enter at the proper time the said assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice to be published as provided by the city charter.

The Recorder is hereby directed to enter at the proper time the said assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice to be published as provided by the city charter.
