Gentlemen: I wish to make a statement and call your attention to the fact that I am an Independent Candidate for the position of Recorder—the office which I now fill. Unfortunately for me I had to undergo an operation, and while in the hospital some unprincipled parties made the statement, and are still talking it at political meetings and other places, that my books are wrong and short in my accounts, and that valuable papers have been lost.

In answer to such statements (especially my accounts) I say it is A LIE and I can prove it to the satisfaction of the tax-payers and voters if I am only given a chance to vindicate myself. I will also state that I have done the work and filed the office for \$40 a month and I think I am entitled to your consideration at least.
