## ORDINANCE NO. 79

An Ordinance Providing for Protection of Sidewalks from Caving Adjacent Banks.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.—That every person, firm, corporation, owner, occupant, lessee or other person in control of any real property within the corporate limits of the City of St. Johns which abuts upon any sidewalk, shall so slope or construct said abutting bank that it shall not cave upon or obstruct said sidewalk.

SECTION 2.—Any person, firm, corporation, owner, occupant, lessee or other person so in control of such real property who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction before the Municipal Court of said City be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00), or imprisonment not less than five days nor more than thirty days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.
