A Matter of Local History

The Diary of James St. Johns Now Printed For The First Time.

(Prepared by George H. Himes.)

1841. July 13th.—This morning we left the encampment and traveled over some rocky country. Killed one buffalo. We met two of our men about 10 o'clock that had been sent by the company on the 6th of July to the rendezvous on Green river to make some arrangements for [the] company in exchanging the oxteams for mules, etc.; but they found no person there, not even an Indian on the whole route. We have not seen an Indian, except two, that are with us, since we left the Larabee fort. We encamped this evening on the banks of the same creek last mentioned.

July 14th.—This day we lay here for the purpose of killing and laying in more meat. We had a hard frost here this morning. We have killed a fine chance of buffalo today. I do not know the number; perhaps about 8 or 9.

July 15th.—This day we moved about 5 miles and camped until next day on Sweetwater creek. The nights are cool here and there is frost nearly every morning. There is no timber here except a few willows along the creek. We are at this time about 8 miles from what is called Wind river mountains. They are in sight of us and are covered with snow. We have seen them for the last 10 days. We leave them to the right hand.

July 16th.—This day we moved about ten miles farther up the creek and encamped about noon for the purpose of drying meat and getting good range for our cattle and horses. We killed a good number of fowl which they call sage cocks. They are larger than a common domestic chicken.

July 17th.—This morning I caught some good fish at the camp. We left the camp at 8 o'clock and moved about three miles farther up the creek. We have killed 3 buffalo bulls today and a number of sage chickens. Buffaloes are getting scarce here. Nothing but bulls. There is no cows here.

July 18th.—We left Sweetwater creek this morning at 6 o'clock and traveled about 17 miles and encamped on one of the head branches of the Colorado of the west. We have killed 2 buffalo today and one antelope. The day was pleasant and we have had no rain since we left the north fork of the Platte river.

July 19th.—This day we traveled about 15 miles and encamped on the bank of a creek called Big Sandy. There is good grass and the wild onions [onions] grow nearly 3 ft. high. We are still in sight of some mountains that we see on the ninth day of this month and others that are covered with snow.

July 20th.—Today we traveled hard all day, and did not get more than 7 or 8 miles on a straight line. Killed no game today except one antelope. We encamped on the bank of Big Sandy this evening. The valley is still destitute of timber and almost every thing else but sage. The valley is wider in some places than in others, varying from one to 60 miles in width.

July 21st.—This morning was pleasant and we traveled all day on the banks of Big Sandy, the same creek that we encamped on last evening and encamped on it this evening.

July 22d.—Today we traveled about 12 miles and encamped at noon on the bank of Big Sandy. Here we stayed until the 23d. Today a man has returned to the camp who was sent out on the 14th to try to find some trader on Colorado river in order to get information respecting the route to California and get a pilot. He brought about 60 men with him who came to trade with us. They informed us that it was impossible for wagons to get to California, but they could get down on the Columbia without much trouble.

July 23d.—This day we traveled about 10 miles and arrived at Green or Colorado river, attended by the men that came to us yesterday and a number of Snake Indians. The river here is about 100 yards wide and has a little timber on its banks, such as cottonwood and willow. Here we stayed until the 25th and traded with the Indians and trappers for packhorses, robes, etc. There is frost here nearly every night, but the days are warm and pleasant. The plains around here are barren and destitute of timber.

July 25th.—Today we crossed the river and traveled about six miles down it and camped on its bank. The Snake Indians and trappers camped with us. There is no buffalo here nor any other kind of game that we can kill except fish. We caught some good fish called chubs. The river is clear at this place and the water is very pure.

July 26th.—This morning we left the river and went about 12 miles and encamped on the bank of a stream called Ham's Fork. It empties into Green River or

Colorado. The Indians and some of the trappers camped with us this evening.

July 27th.—Today we traveled about twelve miles up Ham's Fork and encamped on its banks for the night. Killed two antelope and caught some fish today. The nights are cool and sometimes frosty, the valley being surrounded by mountains that are covered with perpetual snow which has a tendency to cool the air at night.

July 28th.—Today we traveled up Ham's Fork about 15 miles and encamped in the afternoon on its banks, for we frequently travel until the afternoon and lay by until the next day. We caught some good fish here this afternoon. I caught 25 silver myself and one trout.

July 29th.—Nothing happened today worthy of notice. We traveled about 10 or twelve miles farther up the creek and encamped on its banks in the afternoon.

July 30th.—Today we traveled about 10 miles farther up the creek and encamped for the balance of the day, for the pilot thought, as we had to leave the creek, we probably could not get to any more water this afternoon, therefore we encamped on its bank. The water is very good here and the grass is excellent in the creek bottom but the plains [plains] and mountains are barren and destitute of timber as far as we can see.

July 31st.—We left Ham's Fork this morning and traveled about 15 miles and encamped on the bank of a small stream called Black's Fork of Green River. The way we traveled today was hilly, rough and rocky, and we were in sight of a large range of high mountains on our left which are covered with perpetual snow. There is a large smoke in sight and west of the encampment resembling that of a volcano, which we suppose to be grass set on fire by the Indians.

1841. August 1.—Today we traveled about 12 miles through a rough mountainous country and encamped on the bank of a small creek that enters into Black Fork.

August 2d.—This day we went about 12 miles up one fork of the same branch that we encamped on last night. Here one of the wagons broke down and we were obliged to camp until morning and mend it. We are in a small valley this evening, surrounded by high hills and mountains, and in sight of mountains on the right and left or north and south that are covered with snow, some of which are, perhaps, more than one hundred miles off.

August 3d.—We traveled about 20 miles today over high hills and rough places and arrived at Bear River and encamped on its bank. The river is about 50 yards wide here and has a sandy bottom and no timber on its banks excepting small willows. Killed one antelope today.

August 4th.—Today we did not move from the camp, but lay by and caught a good number of trout, some of which were 18 inches in length. There is a great number wild geese here and other fowls, and antelopes.

August 5th.—We traveled about 18 miles today down the bank of Bear River. We caught some trout, and killed 2 antelope and some wild geese. They are very plenty here.

August 6th.—We traveled 21 miles today on the bank of Bear River. There is high hills and mountains on each side of the river. We caught a good number of fine trout, and other fish today and killed one Porcupine [porcupine] and some antelope.

August 7th.—This morning we left the river and came to it again at twelve o'clock. Noon at it and left it again on account of being closed in by high hills on each side. We came to it at night and encamped on its bank.

August 8th.—We did not leave the camp today until twelve o'clock. We traveled about 10 miles and encamped on the bank of a small branch of pure spring water about a mile from the river. We have caught a great number of fish today, trout and chubs.

August 9th.—Today we traveled about 15 miles on this bank of the river except in the afternoon we left the river and returned to it again in the evening and encamped on its bank. Killed two antelope today and caught a number of fine fish.

August 10th.—We traveled about 10 miles today and arrived at the Soda springs on the banks of Bear river. There is a great number of these springs which are constantly bubbling and throwing off gas. Some spout water to a considerable distance and roar like a steamboat. Others form mounds which are round. The water boils out of the middle and forms them by the sediment running down the side. There are high mountains here on each side of the river.

August 11th.—Today we traveled about 4 miles and the company became divided; 4 carts and 4 wagons for Oregon, and 9 wagons for California, myself for one. We traveled about 14 miles farther and encamped on the bank of the river. The river here runs through a deep channel of black rock having the appearance of being melted at some future [previous] time.

ORDINANCE NO. 86

An Ordinance Creating a Board of Fire Commissioners, and Defining Their Duties and Powers.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That there shall be and hereby is created a Board of Fire Commissioners for the City of St. Johns, composed of the Mayor of the said City of St. Johns, who shall be chairman of said board, the Chief of the Fire Department of said city, and the Chief of Police of said city, whose duties and powers shall be as herein designated, and set forth, and a majority of whom shall govern in the deliberations of said board.

SECTION 2. The members of said board shall take their oath of office as such, as required by the charter of said city, and shall hold regular meetings at such times as they, by resolution, may determine, and may hold special meetings at the call of the chairman, or upon the written request of a majority of said board by notice thereof being given to each of the members of the board of the time and object of the meeting. A majority of their number shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECTION 3. For the extinguishment of fires in said city and the protection of property endangered thereby, the said board shall have full control of the fire department of said city, and of the officers, members and employees of said fire department, and shall prescribe the rules for its discipline and government; and the said board shall also have control and management of the public property now pertaining to the fire department of the said City of St. Johns; and that shall hereafter pertain to the department, subject to approval of the council.

SECTION 4. For the further protection of property within the limits of the City of St. Johns, said Board of Fire Commissioners is hereby ordered, directed and required to investigate and pass upon all applications for permission to repair buildings within the fire limits of said City of St. Johns which have been or may be injured by fire or other casualty; provided, however, that in no case where the injury to any building within the said fire limits shall exceed forty per cent thereof shall any permit be granted by said board for repair thereof.

SECTION 5. The right of appeal from the decision of said board to the council of said City of St. Johns by any person aggrieved by the decision of said board is hereby granted.

SECTION 6. Any person, firm or corporation failing or refusing to comply with the orders and requirements of said Board of Fire Commissioners, shall, upon conviction before the municipal court of said city, be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00), or by imprisonment not less than five nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
