REPORT

Of the Annual Conference of the United Evangelical Church.

The conference opened proper April 12, with Bishop H. B. Hartzler in the chair, and twenty-six ministers, eleven lay delegates, three applicants for license to preach the gospel and many visitors present. The session was opened with devotional services, followed by the administration of the sacraments of the Lord's supper. Each session was occupied with questions and business of intense interest.

Bishop Hartzler had charge of all the Sunday services, preaching two most excellent sermons, and in the afternoon conducted the ordination service when three men were ordained to the office of elder and four to the office of deacon. One of the special favors of the day was the privilege of hearing Rev. F. L. Ferch and wife, who were missionaries in China, recently landing at Portland directly from the foreign land, make an interesting address.

In the afternoon and evening \$1,013 was raised for home missions, which was contributed freely. The business session was taken up Monday morning again. Rev. I. L. Pratt and A. A. Winter of Portland were elected ministerial delegates to general conference at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, next October, and Z. M. Knight and C. J. Bartruff of Salem as lay delegates. C. C. Pailing was elected delegate to the board of Missouri, and E. E. McVicker of St. Johns and C. P. Gates of Brooks as visiting committees to the Dallas College.

At 3 p. m. the final report was given stationing the ministers as follows: A. A. Winter First church Portland; J. Bowersox, Second church, Portland; G. F. Phelps, Ockley Green, and E. E. McVicker, St. Johns; with the others at the different places having enough ministers to fill every field. The results of the past year were extremely satisfactory, and the prospect for the future most flattering for the church.

RE-APPOINTED

As Pastor of the Evangelical Church of St. Johns.

Rev. E. E. McVicker, who has been pastor of the Evangelical church at St. Johns for the past two years, and under whose leadership the parsonage was built and the church enlarged and remodeled to triple its former capacity, by the

judgment of the station committee was re-appointed to the same church for the coming year. When his name was announced as pastor of the church at St. Johns it was received with an enthusiastic applause by the members of the church, who were present in a body to hear the report read.

WILL BEGIN

Cutting Lumber for the Public by May 15.

The St. Johns Lumber Co. will soon begin active operations at its new saw mill on the water front. The finishing work is now being rushed to completion, and it is possible that a test of the machinery will be made inside of ten days. The new plant is a modern and up-to-date one. Although planned to cut 50,000 or 60,000 feet of lumber per day, the original plans have been changed and the new mill can easily handle 100,000 feet of lumber when running to its full capacity. Ample power has been provided. Two large engines will be supplied with steam generated in five huge boilers. Providing the necessary machinery arrives the mill will be cutting lumber for the public by May 15. The sawing of logs will begin before this date, the product being used by the company in completing portions of its plant.

In connection with the saw mill a large planing mill and dryer will be erected. In these plants the latest machinery will be installed, enabling the contractors of the peninsula and other points to secure the best of lumber at short notice.

The company is composed of local men, and every inducement should be given them to not only turn out the highest grades of building material, but to induce them to enlarge their plant and make the name of St. Johns and its products famous.

"Made in Oregon" Exposition.

The "Made in Oregon" Exposition, to be held in Portland from May 19 to 26, is an unique affair. It is absolutely a free show and everything to be seen during the week, together with all displays, the spectacular features, parades, the music, fireworks, etc., will be as open as the streets themselves, which, for this occasion, will be the center of attraction. The exhibits and displays will be in the display fronts, in almost unbroken lines and unusual liberties will be allowed, the city ordinances being suspended to allow the crowds to enjoy themselves. Manufacturers of the state, representative of infant industries away from the center of population, will be represented. It promises to be an exhibition that will attract a great deal of attention to the state's industries. Exhibits will be forwarded free of freight charges by the trunk line railroad companies, for the purpose of display, when provision is made in advance for their care.
