The Diary of James St. Johns Now Printed For The First Time.

(Prepared by George H. Himes.)

Portland, Oregon April 10, 1906

August 12th-Today we traveled but 4 miles and encamped on the passes a standard timeplece, and the bank of the river. The Indians that were with us are gone with the Oregon Company. The most of them [that company] are mission- He always catches himself in time,

August 13th. Today we traveled about to miles and encamped for the ballance for the balance of the day on the bank of the river.

August 14th.-This morning we passed by a hot spring near the encampment. It is constantly boiling and smoking and is strongly impregnated with soda. traveled about 15 miles today over hills and mountains and encamped on a small brook about 4 miles from the river.

August 15.-Today we did not travel far, perhaps not more than 8 miles on a straight line, but the way was rough and winding and hilly. We encamped on a small branch about three miles from the river, that is, from Bear River, We killed very little game for a few days, except a few antelope and kerrants [currants] are ripe at this time and other fruit of various kinds of a good flavor.

August 16th. - This day we traveled about 20 miles and encamped on the bank of Bear River near a place called Cash Valley [Cache valley.]

Cash valley on the banks of Bear River, two miles below the falls of that River. Here the river runs which is narrow and nearly perpendicular and about 300 feet high.

August 18 .- This forenoon we came to a muddy, deep creek which we could not cross without going nearly a half day's journey up it, and consequently we traveled about 5 miles today and came down on opposite bank and camped. There s a large number of bot salt springs on the banks of this creek hoiling water-

August 19th.- We traveled about 16 miles today in a roundabout direction. Left the river and had to return to it again in case of having no water. Traveled through a dry, salt plain and could find no water until we returned to

the river. August 20th.-Today we did not travel, but lay by at camp for the purpose of sending men on ahead to search for the Salt lake as

we have no pilot, for he went the Oregon route [Note - This diary thus ends, with the exception of the follow-
