The Review hopes to see a fine exhibit of St. Johns products at the "Made in Oregon" exhibition in Portland May 19 to 26. The woolen mill, flouring mill, veneer and basket factory and iron works can show their products with pride to themselves and to the city. We will all look for them.

One of the novelties in the financial line is the Day and Night Bank which recently opened for business in New York city. As its name signifies, the institution is open for the transaction of business at all hours. Before midnight on its opening day the deposits in the bank reached \$500,000. Last January the stock was all subscribed for at \$500 per share. It is now worth double that amount. It is predicted that all large cities will have banks open for business every hour of the day and night.

There is much complaint among our residents because the industries along the river front do not advertise the location of their plants correctly. Although located at this point and having their headquarters here nearly all the manufacturing plants have the "Portland" prefix to their names. By reading their advertising the people at distant points imagine these institutions are located in Portland. Nearly, if not all their stationery carries a Portland date line. This is misleading and should be remedied. With their workmen living here and every ounce of their product manufactured here St. Johns should get the benefit. With the finest water front locations in the west no industry has any reason to be ashamed of its home in St. Johns. The name St. Johns on every piece of goods manufactured, and on all stationery and other advertising used by the several industries located here would do much to advertise our unsurpassed water and rail shipping facilities. The shrewd buyer would be among the first to note this, and the result would be increased business for every manufacturer in St. Johns, and possibly the location of others at this point. Once the advantages of St. Johns are known and acknowledged the rest will be easy. Strive to make this point an industrial center and all will profit by it, and no one more than those who manufacture and have goods to sell.

**QUIET VISIT**

**CITY COUNCIL.**

**What Was Done at the Meeting Tuesday Night.**

The city council convened in regular session Tuesday evening with Mayor Valentine in the chair and all members present except Alderman King.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Three communications were received from City Engineer Goodrich recommending as follows: That the sewer system should be tested with a hose from the fire hydrants, and reporting that the sewer who are connected with the sewer find that it answers the purpose of carrying all sewerage to the river in a satisfactory manner; that the sewer already completed on Philadelphia, Burlington Place and Jersey street to the river has been accepted; and that levels should be run and profiles made of all streets, starting with Richmond, Dawson and Oswego street on the east to the west line of the city limits, in order that many who wish to build and not knowing the grade should have this information for the asking. The profiles and grades to be tied to the bench marks and to be of public record for all time.

Chief of Police Bredeson made a report on policing Cedar Park on Sundays. Alderman Norton believed the park should have a policeman, and that he should be a St. Johns man, and moved that the mayor appoint special police for Cedar Park for Sunday duty and that his services be paid for by the proprietors of the park. Alderman Bredeson seconded the motion and it was carried, and the recorder instructed to notify the Cedar Park people of the fact.

Alderman Dobie of the Dock committee reported that the public dock was being used as a warehouse by various persons and firms. A motion, made by Alderman Raser, was carried, to the effect that no freight be allowed to remain on the public dock longer than forty-eight hours, and City Attorney Greene was instructed to draft an ordinance to this effect.

Alderman Bredeson believed that the width of Richmond street should be ascertained. Some contend that the width of the street is 80 feet; others say it is only 60 feet. If it is proved that the street is 80 feet wide the public dock is entirely on city property. Alderman Norton thought steps should be taken to settle the matter for all time. It was referred to the committee on docks.

The committee on street lighting recommended arc lights at the following places: Gilbert and Thompson streets, Hartman and Stewart, Jersey and Fessenden, Jersey and Polk, Fessenden and Fillmore, and Columbia Boulevard, Oswego and Dawson streets. The report was accepted and the lights ordered placed as above.

Alderman Bredeson from the water committee recommended that a fire hydrant be placed in front of Geo. Hall's place on Jersey street, and the city attorney was ordered to look up the matter of fire hydrants and their location.

Alderman Bredeson believed the fire district should be extended on Jersey street, but no action was taken.

Ordinance No. 92, to provide for working city prisoners on the streets, was read and passed.

Alderman Hewitt brought up the complaints about bicycle riding on the sidewalks of the city, and the city attorney was ordered to draw up an ordinance prohibiting the same.

John Poff called the attention of the council to an illegal assessment on Burlington street, and the matter was referred to the street committee.

The bid of Pascal Hill for the improvement of Catlin and Lively streets, accompanied by a certified check for \$52, was read and accepted by the finance committee, and the contract ordered drawn.

On motion of Alderman Raser the improvement of Ivanhoe and Leavitt streets was referred back to the city engineer for re-estimate on sidewalks.

Alderman Raser moved that no saloon be allowed to locate at any place on the east side of either Ivanhoe or Jersey streets between St. Johns avenue on the north and Ida street on the south. No action was taken in the matter.

**LOOKS LIKE**

**An Attempt To Destroy the Public School Building.**

But for the timely discovery by Foreman Foote of the Marine Iron Works the St. Johns public school building might now be a heap of ashes or the building in a badly damaged condition. Sunday evening Mr. and Mrs. Foote were out walking. On the way to their home they discovered smoke issuing beneath the rear steps of the school building. Further investigation disclosed a fire eating its way along the lower sill of the steps, Edward King and Percy Bradley, two boys who were near, were called upon and instructed to break in the lattice window of the steps and extinguish the blaze.

On entering the window the boys encountered considerable smoke, but succeeded in putting out the fire after considerable effort. The lower sill was burned into for over an inch along several feet of space. Close to the sill was a large bundle of wrapping paper that had been used to start the fire. From all appearances it looked like a deliberate attempt to destroy the school building. Had the blaze been left unmolested for ten minutes longer serious damage might have resulted.

Earlier in the evening several young men and boys were seen in the vicinity smoking cigarettes. Whether the blaze was started by a discarded match or a spark from one of the cigarettes is mere conjecture. The fact that the wrapping paper had been rolled up and shoved under the sill leads to the suspicion that a deliberate attempt was made to destroy the school building.

The proceeds of such sale of said bonds shall be placed in the treasury to the credit of the proper fund as herein and hereinafter set forth and shall be applied exclusively to the purpose and object mentioned in this Ordinance until such object shall be fully accomplished, after which, if any surplus remains, such surplus shall be transferred to the sinking fund for the payment of said bonds.

Section 3. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be expended exclusively for the erection, construction and maintenance of a public building for City Hall and other city purposes.

Section 4. If at any time hereafter, either before or after the issuance or delivery of said bonds; that the same are not valid and legal obligations against the City of St. Johns, by the decision of any court having jurisdiction in any cause, then the City of St. Johns will, on demand and the surrender of said bonds, or any portion thereof, pay to the holder or holders the par value of such bonds so surrendered, together with interest thereon in like coin at the rate of six per cent per annum, all in United States Gold Coin from the date of said bonds to the date of the surrender thereof; provided that if any interest coupons have been paid on such bonds so surrendered, the amount thereof shall be deducted from the amount of interest to be paid. **ORDINANCE NO. 90**

An Ordinance to Authorize the Issue by the City of St. Johns of Municipal Bonds in the Sum of Ten Thousand Dollars to Run for a Period of Ten Years from the First Day of May, 1906, and Drawing Interest at the Rate of Six Per Cent Per Annum, Interest Payable Semi-Annually, for the Erection, Construction and Maintenance of a Public Building for City Hall and Other City Purposes.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That whereas, the Council of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, did on the fifth day of March, 1906, at a regular meeting of said council, adopt a resolution, which said resolution is of record in the office of the Recorder of said City of St. Johns, declaring its intention of issuing Municipal Bonds in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, to run Ten years and draw interest from the date of said Bonds at the rate of Six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the erection, construction and maintenance of a public building for City Hall and other city purposes, subject to ratification by the qualified electors of the City of St. Johns at the election to be held as provided by the Charter of said City on the 2nd day of April, 1906:

And Whereas, the said Council of the said City of St. Johns, did, at said regular meeting thereof on the said 5th day of March, 1906, authorize, direct and empower the Recorder of said City of St. Johns to publish notices of said election according to law and the Charter of said City of St. Johns, to be held in said City of St. Johns, on the 2nd day of April, 1906, between the hours of nine o'clock A. M. and seven o'clock P. M. of said day for the qualified electors of said City of St. Johns to vote upon the said proposition of issuing said bonds as aforesaid:

And Whereas, the Recorder of said City of St. Johns thereupon procured to be published in the "St. Johns Review," a weekly newspaper of general circulation published in the said City of St. Johns, a notice of said election for four consecutive weeks from the 9th day of March, 1906, to the 30th day of March, 1906, both dates inclusive, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said newspaper on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City of St. Johns:

And Whereas, on the said 2nd day of April, 1906, between the hours of nine o'clock a. m. and seven o'clock p. m. said election was so held in legal and regular form according to law and the Charter of said City of St. Johns:

And Whereas, thereafter the canvassing board duly and legally appointed to canvass the vote had at said election did, on the 3rd day of April, 1906, duly and legally canvass said vote and did certify that there had been cast at said election on said bond question the whole number of 355 voters, that the number of votes cast in favor of the issuance of said bonds by said City of St. Johns, at said election, Two hundred and ninety, and that the number of votes cast against the issuance of said bonds by said City of St. Johns was sixty-five; and which said certificate of said canvassing board is on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City of St. Johns:

And Whereas, it appears that the said proposition of issuing municipal bonds, so submitted to the electors of said City of St. Johns, received more than the necessary two thirds of the votes of the electors voting thereon in favor of the issuance of said bonds for the purpose stated in said notice of said election, and that the said electors of said City of St. Johns have thereby favored, approved and authorized the incurring of the debt contemplated thereby and as authorizing the issuance and sale of bonds therefor, as required by the Charter of said City of St. Johns:

Section 2. Now therefore, the City of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That the Mayor and City Recorder of the City of St. Johns, for, and on behalf of the said City of St. Johns are hereby directed, authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of Bonds of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, to the amount of Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) of denominations of Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) under the seal of the city, with interest coupons attached thereto. That said bonds shall bear date May 1st, 1906, and shall run ten years from date, and bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually from date of bonds, both principal and interest payable in United States Gold Coin at Peninsula Bank, in the City of St. Johns, Oregon; said bonds and coupons shall be signed by the mayor and attested by the recorder of the City of St. Johns, under the seal of the city, and the said bonds shall have attached thereto interest coupons representing each semi-annual payment of interest, and shall be made payable to bearer.

Said bonds shall be sold after advertising the sale thereof in at least one newspaper of general circulation published in the City of St. Johns, and at least one outside of St. Johns. Sealed bids only shall be taken for said bonds, and they shall be sold to the highest responsible bidder, but among equal bidders preference in the sale and allotment shall be given to bidders residing in the state of Oregon. The council shall have power to reject any and all bids and to re-advertise for bids for the same. Said bonds shall be sold for cash in Gold Coin of the United States and at not less than par. The proceeds of such sale of said bonds shall be placed in the treasury to the credit of the proper fund as herein and hereinafter set forth and shall be applied exclusively to the purpose and object mentioned in this Ordinance until such object shall be fully accomplished, after which, if any surplus remains, such surplus shall be transferred to the sinking fund for the payment of said bonds.

Section 3. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be expended exclusively for the erection, construction and maintenance of a public building for City Hall and other city purposes.

Section 4. If at any time hereafter, either before or after the issuance or delivery of said bonds; that the same are not valid and legal obligations against the City of St. Johns, by the decision of any court having jurisdiction in any cause, then the City of St. Johns will, on demand and the surrender of said bonds, or any portion thereof, pay to the holder or holders the par value of such bonds so surrendered, together with interest thereon in like coin at the rate of six per cent per annum, all in United States Gold Coin from the date of said bonds to the date of the surrender thereof; provided that if any interest coupons have been paid on such bonds so surrendered, the amount thereof shall be deducted from the amount of interest to be paid. And the proffer of the surrender of said bonds, or any portion of them, shall constitute a valid and legal obligation to the amount thereof immediately collectible against the said City of St. Johns.
