CITY COUNCIL.

An Interesting Session Productive of Needed Legislation.

The regular meeting of the city council convened Tuesday evening with Mayor Valentine in the chair and all members present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The new sewer, from the Willamette river to the intersection of John and Jersey streets, was accepted by the council on behalf of city.

The franchise of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Co., inherited from the old council, was taken up for action. It stated that on April 6 it had 105 telephones within the city limits and that several applications had been received.

The company asks that it be allowed to erect and maintain poles and wires, and to lay underground wires for the transmission of electricity for telephone and telegraph purposes within the city limits for a period of twenty-five years from the date of the passage of the ordinance.

There was not much enthusiasm manifested by any member of the council after hearing the application read, and the matter was referred to the committee on water and lights.

The use of the city dock as a place for storing freight of all kinds received considerable attention. It was shown that freight of all kinds was landed and allowed to remain until the owner found it convenient to move it, much to the annoyance and inconvenience of the shippers.

Ald. Norton moved that all goods landed from boats upon the public dock be allowed to remain forty-eight hours. At the end of that time they will be taken in charge by the chief of police and placed in storage at a charge of \$1. or more, per ton per month, and that an additional charge of ten per cent be added to the expense incurred to reimburse the city. The motion was carried.

The Allegheny street extension came up for adjustment, and L. B. Chipman, C. S. Thompson and A. Gunderson were named to appraise the tract of land in the controversy.

A petition for an arc light at the corner of Richmond and Jersey streets was referred to the street committee.

M. F. Loy presented a petition asking for a franchise to use certain streets for the purpose of grading and laying rails for a spur railroad connecting the electric line with the brick-yard in the north part of the city.

Mr. Loy asked the use of the streets for a period of twelve years. He stated that it was the intention to put in modern machinery at the brick-yard for the manufacture of pressed brick, and that the spur track was necessary to facilitate business. Referred to street committee.

To determine the width of Richmond street and the location of the city dock, Ald. King moved that the city engineer investigate and report to the council at next meeting.

Ordinances 93 and 94, in regard to improving Leavitt and Ivanhoe streets were read and passed and appear elsewhere in this issue.

The improvement of Thompson street provoked considerable discussion. On motion of Ald. Hewitt it was ordered that bids for the improvement of Thompson street from Lively to Catlin be readvertised.

The matter of transportation at the ferry elicited a warm debate and the members of the council all expressed their opinions. On motion of Ald. Dobie it was ordered to notify Manager Brink of the ferry to provide safe and satisfactory service at the ferry, or give sufficient reason why it could not be done. In case the matter was not given attention and the service improved steps would be taken to revoke the ferry franchise by the council.

Fire Chief Glover appeared before the council and urged the purchase of a steel fire bell, claiming that it could be bought for a nominal sum. The purchase of a steel bell was ordered by a vote of 5 to 2. The following bills were allowed: J. W. Whitsell, street-cleaning \$10.00; Central Hotel, prisoners' meals \$0.00; W. L. Thorndyke, sundries \$6.50

PUBLIC SCHOOL

Building to be Improved by a Four Room Addition.

At a meeting of the school board held on the 10th inst. the board was authorized to improve the sanitary condition of the public school building by the addition of four rooms. It was shown that the above number of rooms could be added to the present building in such a manner as to insure sufficient light and ventilation at an expense of about \$3,000.

To raise the amount a special tax levy will have to be made. A majority of those present thought it unwise to ask for another bond issue, preferring the tax levy. County Superintendent Robinson was present and took part in the discussion.

I noticed that a majority of the people as soon as they received their money took the car for Portland. Many of them, no doubt, went to the city to make purchases with their ready cash. It struck me this is decidedly unfair to the home merchant who is ready to give credit to all who are honest and reliable. I know you can buy as cheap in St. Johns as you can in Portland. Just why a man will allow the home merchant to give him credit from month to month and then spend his ready money in Portland is more than I can conceive. Perhaps a majority of these people do not know they can buy at home as cheap as they can elsewhere. And the home merchants will carry anything for which there is a demand. Anyhow, something should be done to a little more publicity to the fact."
