What Will Be Done by the Grand Army Post and Others

Next Wednesday will be the first time that St. Johns will have a "Memorial Parade" and every citizen of the city is urged to aid General Compton Post in its exercises. The following is the plan of the exercises so far as completed:
 School children, under direction of teachers, will form on Jersey street at school house in double file, open ranks, at 9:30.
 Members of Grand Army Post and veterans of both the civil war and the late wars will form at Odd Fellows hall.
 Civic societies, cornet band, and all others will form between these two points.
 Promptly at ten o'clock the line of march will be taken up in the following order:

 Veterans of Civil War
 Veterans of Spanish-American War
 Teachers and Children
 Speakers
 Odd Fellows
 Woodmen of World
 Redmen in Regalia

 Private Citizens.

The line of march will be on Jersey to Richmond, on Richmond to Hayes, on Hayes to Burlington, on Burlington to Ivanhoe, on Ivanhoe to Chicago, on Chicago to Jersey, on Jersey to Burlington, thence to Courthouse Place.
 Then will take place the exercises at "The Unknown Grave," followed by an oration, singing, music by the band, etc.

THE QUESTION.

Shall We Vote "Yes" or "No" on the Local Option Liquor Law?

The liquor men's amendment repeals the last seven sections of the present local option law. Why? Because these sections require that the circuit judge shall charge the grand jury to diligently inquire after violations of the local option law; that the district attorney shall swear out warrants against places where "blind pigs" are being run; that the sheriff, armed with such warrant, shall forcibly enter such places and arrest the lawbreakers; that the holding of a United States government revenue license stamp shall be prima facie evidence that the law is being violated. The liquor men seek to repeal these sections in order that they may make it practically impossible to detect and convict "booze sellers" who violate the law and defy the people. Is that a square deal? Vote in favor of local option and vote against the proposed amendment.
