With its bonds bringing more than 11 per cent of their face value St. Johns has secured a bit of advertising that will travel far and wide.

In granting the franchise to the telephone company it might be well to give the matter of rentals of phones a little attention. While the charges of the company may be fair, it will be well to put in a clause prohibiting exorbitant and excessive charges. A corporation with a franchise in its inside pocket is not in business with a view of giving away anything it can obtain money for. Hence it will not be a bad idea to not only find out what the company wants, but what it intends to charge for the use of its phones.

On June 4th the voters of Oregon will again make use of the initiative and referendum law. Every voter should know the merit of each measure represented. This is especially necessary in the case of woman suffrage. Shall the women vote? Every man should declare himself at the polls. This measure was submitted at the last election and 27,283 voters, while voting the rest of the ticket, failed to mark their ballots for or against this great measure to the welfare of the state. A failure to mark a ballot is equivalent to a vote on the other side. Experience in the four states wherein woman suffrage has been adopted, has demonstrated the fact that only a very small percentage of the women vote, and they consist of the lowest and most debased class.

THE ELDER
Safely Docked at St. Johns Last Sunday.

After lying sixteen months on a rock in the Columbia river near Goble the steamer Geo. W. Elder was lifted high and dry in the dry dock at St. Johns at 7 o'clock Monday morning. The work of docking the boat began at 11 o'clock Sunday and the workmen labored without intermission until the job was finished.

The task of raising and docking the boat was a herculean one, and has baffled the best engineers on the coast. The bottom of the vessel showed a dent in the plates as large as a load of hay. It took 400 barrels of cement and an equal amount of rock to stop the leak. This is practically the only damage done. The machinery is in good shape. At the time the ship was sinking all the machinery was sprayed with oil and several barrels of grease poured over the bright work. A large force of men are now making the necessary repairs. The manner in which the boat was docked reflects great credit on the management of the St. Johns dry dock officials.

Concerning the particular rock on which the Elder foundered we learn that it has been known to river men for some time. Three years ago a scow loaded with rock struck it and went down. On all sides of this rock the water is 80 feet deep, while 200 feet away it reaches a depth of 540 feet. After the costly experience of the Elder this menace to navigation in the Columbia will undoubtedly be destroyed.

An Ordinance Assessing the Cost of Improving Pittsburg Street from the Southerly Line of Bradford Street to the Southerly Line of Crawford Street in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Directing an Entry of Such Assessment in the Docket of City Liens

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The council of the City of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Pittsburg street from the southerly line of Bradford street to the southerly line of Crawford street in said city of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of council of record and date March 21st, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published at St. Johns, for three consecutive weeks from March 23rd, 1906, to April 6th, 1906, inclusive, as shown by affidavit of foreman of said paper on file, and the legal posting of notices of such street improvement, as shown by affidavit of City Engineer on file with City Recorder—no remonstrance having been filed—and as provided by resolution of March 21st, 1906, the sum of \$754.79 being City Engineer's preliminary estimate, as amended, of the cost, but to be more accurately determined by said City Engineer.

The time within which said improvement is to be completed is hereby fixed at sixty days from last publication of notice for proposals for said work, which proposals must be filed with the Recorder of said city by June 19th, 1906, at 4 o'clock p. m.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved accordingly and that the Recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three (3) insertions in successive publications in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation in the said city of St. Johns, Oregon, inviting proposals for the making of the whole of said street improvement or for sidewalk or street between curb lines separately, and said sum, as estimated by the City Engineer in his amended estimate as cost thereof, or such sum as shall finally be fixed and determined by City Engineer, not exceeding said sum, is hereby assessed to the lots, parts of lots and tracts in their several proportions in the assessment district of said Pittsburg street from the southerly line of Bradford street to the southerly line of Crawford street, in the respective amounts to be hereafter determined and assessed to said lots, parts of lots and tracts as being benefited by said street improvement, heretofore declared and now designated as all the lots, parts thereof and parcels of land within a line 100 feet from the outside line of each side of said Pittsburg street as herein described.

The Recorder is hereby directed to enter at the proper time the said assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by the city charter.

Proposals for Street Work

An Ordinance Assessing the Cost of Improving Chicago Street from the North Line of Hayes Street to the South Line of Portland Boulevard in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Directing an Entry of Such Assessment in the Docket of City Liens.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The council of the City of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Chicago street from the north line of Hayes street to the south line of Portland Boulevard in said City of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of council of record and date May 1st, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published at St. Johns, for the period of three consecutive weeks from May 4th, 1906, to May 18th, 1906, inclusive, as shown by affidavit of foreman of said paper on file; and the legal posting of notices of such street improvement as shown by affidavit of city engineer on file with city recorder (no remonstrance having been filed) and as provided by resolution of May 1st, 1906, the sum of \$5,147.69 being city engineer's preliminary estimate, as amended, of the cost, but to be more accurately determined by said city engineer.

The time within which said improvement is to be completed is hereby fixed at sixty days from last publication of notice for proposals for said work, which proposals must be filed with the recorder of said city by June 19th, 1906, at 4 o'clock p. m.

ORDINANCE NO. 97
An Ordinance to Amend Section 12 of Ordinance No. 54, Entitled "An Ordinance to Impose and Regulate Licenses and Provide for the Manner of Issuing the Same," Passed and Approved Aug. 7, 1905.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That section twelve (12) of Ordinance No. 54 of the City of St. Johns, entitled "An Ordinance to Impose and Regulate Licenses and Provide for the Manner of Issuing the Same," passed by the council and approved by the Mayor of said City of St. Johns August 7, 1905, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 12. Shooting galleries shall pay a quarterly license of thirty dollars. Every place or building where guns or pistols are kept for shooting at targets, whether for hire or not, every Chinese ball game, every cane rack, or any game, except a bowling alley, where a ball, ring, shot or missile of any kind is shot or in any way thrown or propelled against any mark, image, or obstacle whatever, and for which a fee or price is
