ANNOUNCEMENT.

On June 1st A. W. Markle became the possessor of one-half interest in this paper and printing plant, and henceforth The Review will be published under the firm name of McKeon & Markle. There were all kinds of scraps and all kinds of counting, but one of the most interesting of them all was that of the "wets" and "drys" of St. Johns.

Although woman suffrage was defeated at the recent election the battle will be renewed two years hence. So say the prominent workers of the movement.

The entire Republican state ticket with the exception of governor was elected last Monday. The popularity of Governor Chamberlain was too much to overcome, and he was re-elected by a handsome majority.

The expose of the manner of canning meats by the packing houses of the meat trust will not have the effect of causing a demand for canned meats of any kind. According to the findings of the investigators it seems that only the flesh of diseased animals, colored with chemicals and highly seasoned with spices, is used in compounding the delicacies of the canned line.

Defeated by a narrow margin of five votes for the office of sheriff of Multnomah county, Tom Word has announced that he will contest the election of Robert L. Stevens. The official canvass gave Stevens 9,260 and Word 9,255. On the completion of the count Stevens was sworn in as sheriff. Word claims gross frauds were committed, notably in the Sellwood district, and that a gain of one vote in each precinct in the recount will make a difference of 90 votes in his favor. The recount may show a gain for Stevens. Each candidate claims many irregularities on the part of the other, and each claims the final count will result in his favor.

The candidate who made a newspaper campaign is the one who delivered the goods or who could show results. The street corner candidate in every instance was snowed under by the avalanche of votes cast for his more enterprising rival. In using the newspapers the candidates and the principles they stood for were taken directly to the voter, and left an impression that lasted to the day of election. The newspaper campaign had its origin in the west and is being introduced and favorably received in the east. The intelligent, reasoning voter is reached and convinced, and that is all the man running for office desires. Future campaigns will be conducted by the liberal use of printers' ink.

COMMERCIAL CLUB.

An Even Dozen Members Meet in M. W. A. Hall.

Out of the eighty members of the Commercial Club an even dozen met at the regular meeting at M. W. A. hall Wednesday evening.

After roll call and the reading and approval of the minutes of the last meeting the reports of the standing committees were called for, but on account of the meagre attendance little business was done along the various lines.

Mr. Norton, from the committee appointed to confer with the officials of the telephone company in regard to better telephone facilities in the city, made an explanatory talk. As satisfactory progress had been made by the council in the matter the report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The matter of suitable advertising came up and was discussed at length, but no action taken. A card of thanks was tendered the Portland Evening Journal for the illustrated write-up of St. Johns and several of its industries last Monday. Important business of interest to every member of the club will come up at the regular meeting next Wednesday evening, and all members are urged to be present.

Prospective bidders on street improvements now under way in this city may now bid either for the entire work or may segregate the bid so as to include only the grading or the sidewalk. ELECTION

A Spirited Contest and Prohibition is Defeated.

The election last Monday settled for a time the much discussed question as to whether St. Johns will be an open or a closed town as far as the sale of intoxicating liquors is concerned. Prohibition was the main issue and it was defeated by the narrow margin of seven votes. To decide the issue two precincts—Nos. 66 and 67—were combined. In Precinct No. 66 there were 17 votes cast, with a majority of two against prohibition. In Precinct No. 67, comprising the city of St. Johns, 426 votes were cast. Out of this number 343 voted on the wet and dry question. The result was in doubt until the last half-dozen ballots were reached. Out of the 343 ballots marked 174 were wet and 169 dry, giving a majority of five for the wets out of 343 ballots marked. These five votes of No. 67 and the two votes of No. 66 in favor of an open town gave the anti-prohibitionists a majority of seven. Eighty-five ballots were unmarked on the prohibition issue.

While there is some talk the general opinion is that there will be no contest. Each side is satisfied, and the whole matter will probably be allowed to rest until the next general election.

There was considerable confusion in regard to the registration of voters. Probably between 25 and 35 voters had to be sworn in, necessitating needless delay and causing considerable comment.

For the governorship Chamberlain received 202 votes against 187 cast for Withycombe.

For U. S. senator Gearin received 175 votes to Bourne's 160. Geo. A. Steel, for state treasurer, was well remembered, receiving 231 votes to 77 for Matlock, his nearest rival.

Willis S. Duniway, for state printer, was complimented by 229 votes, against 74 for Taylor I. Scott, Democrat.

For circuit judge, Department No. 2, Alfred F. Sears won over Oglesby Young by a vote of 228 to 104, while C. U. Gantenlein, for circuit judge, Department No. 4, received 241 votes against 84 cast for H. B. Nicholas.

For county judge L. R. Webster received 203 against 147 for John Van Zante.

In the ballot for sheriff Tom Word received the banner vote of the city in securing 247 votes against 135 for Stevens.

For county clerk, Frank Fields, 73 votes, against 51 for Samuel Osborn, Socialist.

Carl A. Brandes distanced all rivals in the balloting for county auditor, having 209 votes. For coroner J. P. Finley had 212 votes, against 49 for W. S. Armstrong.

The amendment to the local option laws giving the prohibitionists and anti-prohibitionists equal privileges was defeated by a vote of 213 to 130. This vote can be accounted for by reason that many did not understand the wording on the ballot.

The constitutional amendment giving cities and towns exclusive power to enact and amend their own charters received an affirmative vote of 205 against 51 for the negative. The Republican candidates for the state legislature won out by handsome majorities.

G. L. Perrine of St. Johns, candidate for member of the legislature on the Socialist ticket, received a handsome complimentary vote from his friends.

EXTRA SESSION

Of the City Council Held Wednesday Afternoon.

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held Wednesday afternoon with Mayor Valentine in the chair and all members present except Ald. Hewitt.

The principal business was to consider the telephone franchise and to pass the street improvement ordinances.

Ald. Norton of the finance committee is in favor of immediate action on the telephone franchise.

He wanted certain restrictions placed upon the company as a guarantee of good service, but believed both the city and the company should make concessions. He was willing to cut out the clause in the franchise requiring the payment of 2 1/2 per cent of the gross receipts to the city. He thought 15 years was a long enough time for the life of the franchise. The proposition to accept the 10-cent rate to Linnton looked good to him. But something should be done and that promptly. Immediate and good service was imperative, and the sooner it was obtained for St. Johns the better.

The Portland telephone franchise was read and the recorder and city attorney were instructed to make the proper comparisons of the Portland franchise and the one asked for by the Pacific States Co.

The street improvement ordinance for Charleston, Hayes and Monteth streets were taken up and ordinances passed ordering the work.

On motion of Ald. Dobie the ordinance in reference to storage on the public dock was amended so as to include outgoing as well as incoming freight, to the effect that it shall not lie on the dock longer than 48 hours.

NEW STEAMER

To Be Built at the St. Johns Ship Yards.

The St. Johns Shipbuilding plant has secured the contract for a new sternwheel steamer for the Columbia & Cowlitz River Transportation Co. The new boat will be 145 feet long, 28 1/2 feet beam, with a depth of hold of 7 feet. She will be equipped with the machinery taken from the Regulator, which was destroyed by fire a few months ago, caused by an explosion of her oil tanks. This machinery was entirely uninjured by the fire, and has been overhauled and put in first class shape. The new steamer will be used for towing, and work will begin at once.

ORDINANCE NO. 105

An Ordinance Assessing the Cost of Improving Hayes Street from the Westerly Line of Burlington Street to the Easterly Line of Maple Street in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Directing an Entry of Such Assessment in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The Council of the City of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Hayes street from the westerly line of Burlington street to the easterly line of Maple street in the said City of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of council of record and date May 1st, 1906, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published at St. Johns, for three (3) consecutive weeks from May 4th, 1906, to May 18th, 1906, inclusive, as shown by affidavit of foreman of said paper on file, and the legal postment as shown by affidavit of City Engineer on file with City Recorder—no remonstrance having been filed—and as provided by resolution of May 1st, 1906, the sum of \$10,191.07 being the City Engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost of the improvement, but to be more accurately determined by said City Engineer.

The time within which said improvement is to be completed is hereby fixed at sixty days from last publication of notice for proposals for said work, which proposals must be filed with the Recorder of said city by June 26th, 1906, at four o'clock p. m.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered, that the Recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three (3) insertions in successive publications in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, inviting proposals for either the making of the whole of said improvement or for sidewalk or grading separately, and said sum, or such sum as shall finally be fixed and determined by said City Engineer, not exceeding said sum, is hereby assessed to the lots, parts of lots and tracts in their several proportions in the assessment district of said Hayes street from the westerly line of Burlington street to the easterly line of Maple street, in the respective amounts to be hereafter determined and assessed to said lots, parts of lots and tracts as being benefited by said street improvement, heretofore declared and now designated as all the lots, parts thereof, and parcels of land within a line 100 feet from the outside line of each side of said Hayes street as herein described.

The Recorder is hereby directed to enter at the proper time the said assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by the city charter.
