### SOMETHING

#### About the Fines Paid in the City Police Court.

The market price of a plain, ordinary drunk at Recorder Thorn-dyke's temple of justice is \$5 and costs. Very few people know what this means—the exact amount required to settle with the recorder and discover the cause of that dark brown taste the morning after. When the judge murmurs "Five dollars and costs," the victim becomes very much interested as the following is penned on the docket:

Arresting .....	\$1 00
Jailing .....	50
Attending trial .....	50
Docket entries .....	80
Filing complaint .....	10
Final judgment .....	50
Fine .....	3 40
Total .....	5 00
Total .....	8 40

The above translated means that John Doe, arrested by the police, has to pay \$1 because the officer tapped him on the shoulder and said "Come along with me!" He is taken to the station and locked up. That adds 50 cents more to his bill. When his trial comes off, whether he pleads guilty or not, another 50 cents is added to remind him of the way of the transgressor, etc. The 80 cents is for docketing the entries. These come at 10 cents per entry, and there are never less than eight of them. When the judge knits his brow and solemnly pronounces judgment on the wreck in front of him it adds 50 cents more to the expense. This makes a total of \$3.40 for costs. Then the fine of \$5 is added, making a total of \$8.40 for some one to pay.

Usually the prisoner is broke. He wooed King Gambrinus as long as his money lasted. When the judge ascertains the condition of affairs the unfortunate is given a good lecture and an opportunity to raise the money for his freedom. Sometimes a friend comes to the rescue. Sometimes a wife or a mother unties a handkerchief and counts out the required amount. As soon as the money is paid it is turned over to the city treasurer. Only in civil cases do the officials receive fees.

In case the prisoner is a chronic offender or one of the hardened class he has to pay. If it is the man's first offense or there are extenuating circumstances he is let off with a severe reprimand and told not to be caught again or it will go hard with him. As yet no one has appeared a second time before Recorder Thorn-dyke.

But, if a man will not pay the fine and tries to bluff out of it, he will be taken out and put to work on the streets, laboring eight hours a day and receiving \$2 per day until the amount of his fine is earned. Only once has a case of this kind come up. When the erring one saw the shovel provided for his use by the officer he wilted and growled "I'll pay."
