COUNCIL.

Important Business Transacted at a Lengthy Session.

Business of considerable importance was scheduled for the meeting of the council Tuesday evening last, and as a consequence there were many in attendance when Mayor Valentine called the council to order. There was business to transact concerning the telephone franchise, granting of a liquor license, awarding contracts for street improvements, concerning the construction of the Jower building, widening of streets, adding further equipment to the fire department, the purchase of a chemical engine and installing an automatic fire alarm system, allowing of bills, and several minor matters.

The minutes of the last two meetings were read and approved. Knight & Glover, proprietors of the pool room on Burlington street, applied for a license to sell intoxicating liquors. The petition was accompanied by a certified check for \$1,000. Referred to the license committee.

A communication was received from Nancy Caples concerning the widening of Richmond street. Mrs. Caples offered to donate one-half the land necessary for the street providing the city would run a straight line and purchase the land necessary for the other half. Referred to street committee.

In the matter of the widening of Modoc street the committee reported that E. J. Hufford refused to donate the land necessary for the improvement. Upon motion Messrs. Chipman, Couch and Gunderson were appointed appraisers to assess the damages and benefits along the route of Modoc street, and that they meet Tuesday, June 19, at 10 a. m. to assess the damages and benefits.

The matter of regulating the use of the city dock as to the storage of freight was adjusted by the passing of Ordinance No. 106, found elsewhere in this issue.

The ordinance granting a franchise to the Pacific States Telephone Co. was read the first and second times and upon motion of Ald. Norton was laid over for one week.

A lot of telephone and telegraph poles belonging to the city that have been lying in the river for the past several months were ordered sold. Manager Brink of the ferry petitioned the council to be allowed to charge 10 cents fare after 7 p. m., explaining that all the regular traffic was taken care of during the regular hours from 6 a. m. to 7 p. m. The council saw the fairness of the request, and hereafter the fare at the ferry will be 10 cents per trip after 7 p. m.

A representative of an automatic telegraph fire alarm system was given a hearing and advocated the purchase of a system by the council at an expense of \$700. No action was taken in the matter.

The construction of the Jower building was brought up and a committee appointed to secure competent engineers and architects to pass upon the safety of the building. A water hydrant was ordered installed at the northeast corner of Burlington and Bradford streets.

The improvement of Ivanhoe street was awarded to F. J. Koerner and N. A. Gee & Co., the former securing the sidewalks, etc., and the latter the grading.

There was some discussion about the purchase of a chemical engine and 500 feet of hose for the fire department, and the fire committee was ordered to investigate and report.

The location of a dumping ground was brought up and ordered investigated.
