COUNCIL.

More Street Improvements—Telephone Franchise.

All members of the council were present Tuesday evening, except Ald. Hewitt, when the mayor called the meeting to order. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A petition from the Portland woolen mills for a switch on the east side of Bradford street from Baltimore to New York street was presented, discussed and granted.

The management of Cedar Park objected to the payment of \$2 per Sunday for the policing of the park. The council thought the benefits derived were equal to the amount assessed and refused to take any action in the matter.

The telephone franchise came up and was the cause of considerable discussion. The telephone people are of the opinion that the building of a central station and the employment of three persons and a lineman should be sufficient compensation to the city for a franchise. At present there are 108 phones in the city. Orders are in for nine more. They think the payment of 2 1/2 per cent of the gross earnings would work a hardship on them. They are willing to pay 5 per cent of the net earnings. The council is of the opinion that the franchise is worth something. On motion of Ald. Raser the matter was tabled for one week. Later it was moved by Ald. King that the percentage be made one per cent of the gross earnings. A tie vote resulted and the motion was lost on the vote of Mayor Valentine.

The recorder was ordered to confer with the property owners on Edison street from Burlington street to St. Johns avenue and ascertain whether they would be willing to pay for the establishment of a grade on the street.

An ordinance for the improvement of Richmond street was ordered for the next meeting.

The purchase of 500 feet of hose for the fire department was ordered. On the proposition to purchase hose at 70 cents a foot a tie vote resulted. The mayor cast a negative vote. On motion by Ald. Raser 500 feet of Patrol hose was ordered at 80 cents per foot.

The fire hydrant ordered at the last meeting at the corner of Bradford and Burlington streets was ordered placed in position.

The plans for a drinking fountain for animals, drawn by City Engineer Goodrich, were shown. A special committee was appointed to ascertain the cost of a public watering trough, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

A temporary water pipe was ordered placed at the bank corner to supply water for the thirsty on the Fourth of July.

The committee appointed to pass on the construction of the lower building—Ald. King, Norton and Bredeen—made the following report, which was adopted.

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:—

Your special committee to investigate the condition of the lower building submit the following report: Witnesses were called and examined—the same being the supervising contractor, the sub-contractor of the brick-work, the carpenters and employees who made the foundation, also the owner and the tenant of the building, and the city engineer. The evidence of these we here submit.

Your committee made a thorough examination of the building. It found that the north wall was out of perpendicular not to exceed two and one-half inches at a distance from the ground of from three to eight feet, but this did not extend a greater distance than about one-third the length of the entire wall. The cracks in the north wall of the second floor on the inside indicate a slight settling of the building, but not any more so than other brick buildings show—and not of an alarming nature. The evidence shows that the north wall has not changed its appearance or condition since it was built. The findings of your committee are that the building is safe for occupancy and habitation, or for any ordinary business—aside from manufacturing or printing or some business which would necessitate machinery that would cause jarring or vibration. MR. THORNDYKE

Has a Few Words to Say Regarding Certain Statements Made.

At the school meeting Monday evening the chairman took occasion to score me over the back of The Review, and, what was also a matter of very bad taste upon his part, took the liberty of intruding matters wholly irrelevant to the subject under discussion upon a good-natured audience.

It seems that the ill-natured thrust against The Review was made because I, at one time, made a charge for the insertion of a set of resolutions engrossed by the school-teachers. The present management of The Review had no more to do with the charge on that set of resolutions than the august chairman of the recent meeting had to do with the contract of the late addition to the school house—possibly not so much!

There were some things not touched upon at the meeting Monday which might have been discussed with pleasure and profit. In advertising for bids for building why was so little time given the contractor for figuring? Why were not home contractors given an equal chance with outside bidders? Why were not plans and specifications kept in St. Johns—in place of forcing prospective bidders to go to Portland? How did it happen that a partner of one of the directors of the school board secured the first contract—and had the lowest bid in on the next job? How does it happen that the firm selling school supplies to this school owns a block of stock in the oil well being sunk by one of the directors?

Of course these are trifling queries—but it might be well to let the public know something about them. I would not for worlds cast any insinuation that there had been undue influence used anywhere; but it is a matter of much comment how the astute chairman, who certainly cannot preside properly over a meeting, can wield so much influence over another member of the board.

There was a charge made by me when I was with The Review for the insertion of a set of resolutions—and if the same circumstance should similarly arise once more I would do as I did. Had I known that some of the members of the board were so "close and near" as to refuse to pay for the work out of the public funds and that the teachers would have to pay for the same I should certainly have made no charge—or have paid it myself.

But it seems unfair to have The Review threshed for what were my own individual acts. And to this end I desire to have this explanation made—and the few suggestions made as well. And there are other suggestions. W. L. THORNDYKE.
