SECTION 1. That Section Ten of Or-dinance No. Ten of the City of St. Johns, Oregon, being an ordinance to impose and regulate licenses and regulate the manner of issuing same, be, and the same is, hereby amended so as to read

"SECTION 10. Peddlers on foot shall pay a license of two and fifty-hundreths dollars (\$2.50) per day. Hawkers or peddlers with stand, wagon or cart shall pay a license of five dollars (\$5.00) per day. Each and every person who shall offer for sale from a stand, wagon or cart upon any street, public or open ground within the limits of the City of St. Johns shall be deemed a hawker under this ordinance, and whenever more than one per-son shall sell or offer to sell from the same stand, wagon or cart, each of such persons shall be required to take out the license herein provided for."
