RUNAWAY

Reckless Chauffeur the Cause of Serious Accident.

As a result of the horses attached to the rig in which they were riding becoming frightened and running away Mrs. J. H. Mills and Richard Shepard were seriously injured while out riding on the evening of the Fourth.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Shepard, Mrs. J. H. Mills and Mrs. M. F. Loy were enjoying a ride about the city in a two-seated carriage. On the boulevard near Maagley junction an automobile driven at a reckless speed approached them. The driver of the machine made no attempt to slow up, dashed by, striking the carriage with the automobile as he passed, and continued on his way with increased speed, not even looking around to ascertain if the occupants of the carriage needed help.

The jolt and the noise caused the horses to jump to one side, breaking the tongue in two and throwing Mr. Shepard unconscious to the ground. With the lines dragging on the ground the frightened team dashed down the road with the three ladies sitting helpless in their seats. The carriage was overturned. Mrs. Shepard escaped unharmful, Mrs. Loy with slight bruises, while Mrs. Mills was badly shaken up and received serious injuries to her back. Mr. Shepard has a sprained wrist and a badly bruised side and face.

As soon as news of the accident reached the city a conveyance was sent and the party conveyed to their homes and given proper attention.

The number of the automobile or the identity of its driver is not known.

BUILDING

Immense Oil Tanks on the Bank of the Willamette.

At what is known as the Roberts farm the O. R. & N. railroad is now building a number of large oil tanks. The work is being done by the Marine Iron Works of this city. The iron is now all on the ground and work is progressing rapidly. When completed the tanks will have a capacity for storing about 60,000 gallons of oil. A large dock 258 1/2 feet is now ready for the landing of steamers. Fuel oil will be stored to supply both river craft and locomotives. A pipe line and pumping station will be built to facilitate the handling of the fuel oil. The tanks are built on the high ground on the ten-acre tract recently purchased, running to the river and adjoining the right of way.
