## OF INTEREST

### To All Old Timers and New Comers in St. Johns.

(Continued from last week.)  
After leaving Rodgers, I started up the hill and I saw a man coming at full gallop. Hump, halt, salute! and I at once recognized the only Fred Ramsey, the companion of Grant, Sheridan, and others of renown in the days that tried men's courage. How often he has told of trips in a canoe with Gen. Grant to Lauries Island, of the time they used to have at Fort Vancouver, when that city was the leading social center of the northwest. When the soldiers and Hudson Bay company's men used to meet around the old army post and tell their wonderful stories of how they met and conquered their foes—the red men of the woods.  
What do you think, Mr. Editor, it has only been a few years since these brave men and women, who made Oregon what it is today, have passed away. A few years ago, some who are living in our midst, have heard the story from the lips of those who came here a few years after Lewis and Clark blazed the way, and I think if there is anything that should appear a century from now in the annals of history relating to this generation, it should be that we gave all the tributes of honor and praise to the Oregon pioneers.

Apropos of this, Mr. Editor, would it not be a good time to take up the matter of a tombstone for one of those same old pioneers, the man who so loved his adopted state and the city that bears his name, that he willed all he had to the children that there might be a school established where all might be educated, irrespective of creed or color. It is no fault of his that the same school is not in evidence. Now, if it was, it would stand as a monument to his philanthropy. As it lies in a grave unmarked and uncare for, the same as though he was in a paupers' grave. Will not some of the old pioneers of St. Johns take this matter up and see that one of the early settlers of this state and city is honored as he should be.

Strolling on I see a little square house under the hill and on looking closer I see the school house, where a number of the men and women of today went to school in the days when the teachers boarded around among the patrons of the school. And then came Professors Rutenic, Deming and Mabel Walker, nee Hansen. When the annual school meetings were held, when Leatrod, Gattson and Byers would meet and have to send out to get some one to come in so they could hold an election. The writer thought how different it is now, especially when some one has an axe to grind or a pet hobby to advance. Then we had one teacher. He had to cut his own wood and clean his own room. Some thought it was awful when a janitor was hired, and I think Mrs. M. J. Massey was the first janitor the school of St. Johns ever had.

## LARGE PURCHASES

### Of Land on the Lower Peninsula by M. L. Holbrook.

Few men have more confidence in the future of St. Johns and the lower peninsula than M. L. Holbrook. Although he has purchased, platted and sold a great deal of land, built many residences and business blocks, his confidence in the future does not seem to waver. Recently he purchased 103 acres in what is now known as the packing house district, east of the city. The purchase price was \$50,000. Last Monday he paid \$10,000 for six acres of highly cultivated land with a commodious residence on it near Maegley junction.  
Both of these tracts will be platted and placed on the market by Mr. Holbrook. With the improvement of the property of the big packers begun and the work on the bridges across the Columbia and Willamette being hurried along as fast as possible, it will not be long before the railroad will be running. By the time this work is completed the new addition to be platted by St. Johns' premier pusher will be the center of a new residence and business district on the peninsula.

## ORDINANCE NO. 109

An Ordinance Authorizing and Directing the Erection of a City Hall and Declaring the Cost Thereof; Authorizing and Directing the Issuance and Sale of Bonds of the City of St. Johns, Aggregating Ten Thousand Dollars Par Value in Amount for the Purpose of Paying for the Cost of Erecting Said City Hall, Providing for the Advertisement for the Sale and Prescribing the Form of Said Bonds.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:  
SECTION 1. That the City of St. Johns shall erect a City Hall and that the said City Hall shall be erected at a total cost of ten thousand dollars.  
SEC. 2. That for the purpose of raising money to pay for erecting the said City Hall the City of St. Johns shall issue and sell its negotiable coupon bonds, aggregating ten thousand dollars par value in amount. The said bonds shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness; they shall be dated the 9th day of July, 1906, shall be of the denomination of five hundred dollars each, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the ninth day of January and the ninth day of July in each year. The principal of said bond shall be payable to the bearer ten (10) years from the date thereof upon the presentation and surrender of the said bonds and the half-yearly interest thereon shall be payable to the bearer upon presentation and surrender of the said coupons as they respectively become due, both principal and interest to be payable at the Peninsula Bank, St. Johns, Oregon. Said bonds shall be exempt from taxation either by the State of Oregon or by any county or municipal corporation therein.  
SEC. 3. That the said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the Recorder of the City of St. Johns and the corporate seal of said city shall be affixed thereto. They shall be in substantially the following form, to-wit:

**CITY OF ST. JOHNS, STATE OF OREGON, COUNTY OF MULTNOMAH.**

The City of St. Johns in Multnomah county, State of Oregon, acknowledges it is indebted and for value received hereby undertakes and promises to pay to the bearer on the presentation and surrender of this bond, on the ninth day of July, 1916, at the Peninsula Bank, St. Johns, Oregon, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness and to pay interest thereon from date at the rate of six per cent per annum at the said Peninsula Bank semi-annually on the ninth day of January and the ninth day of July of each year, until the presentation and surrender of said coupons as they respectively mature. This bond is exempt from taxation either by the State of Oregon or by any county or municipal corporation therein.  
This bond is one of a series of bonds of like date and tenor issued by the City of St. Johns, numbered consecutively from number one to twenty, inclusive, aggregating ten thousand dollars par value, in amount, for the purpose of providing money to be used in erecting a City Hall.  
This bond and the series thereof is issued and put in force and in conformity to the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Oregon entitled "An Act to incorporate the City of St. Johns, Multnomah county, State of Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State January 20, 1905.  
And it is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things relating to the issue and sale hereof, have been properly done and performed in regular and due time, form and manner as required by law, and that the total of indebtedness of said city, including this bond to the date of sale hereof, does not exceed the statutory or constitutional limitation of the State of Oregon or of the limitation provided by the charter of said city.
