OIL THE STREETS.

Shall the Experiment Be Tried in St. Johns?

The dust that has covered the town and everything in it for the past two months has suggested numerous schemes for relief. Some proposed buying a sprinkling cart and keeping the streets saturated with water. Others suggested that the streets in the vicinity of the hydrants be flooded with water every morning. A number think the best and cheapest way to get rid of the dust nuisance is to have the streets oiled with the heavy road oil now used.

A representative of a Portland road oiling company who was here gave considerable information on the subject of oiled streets and was the means of converting several to his method of keeping down the dust.

"There was a time," said the road oil man, "when it took considerable talk and illustration to convince people that oiled streets are the best, but it is different now. In California where they have plenty of dust, oil has driven the sprinklers out of business. Los Angeles has 700 miles of oiled streets. In San Francisco there is an ordinance providing for the oiling of the streets in the residence portion. People have found out that oiling the streets is the only way to keep down the dust. One oiling is sufficient for a whole season. It accomplishes what water cannot do. Instead of washing out the dust and carrying it to the curb to be blown away by the wind when it dries, oil packs and hardens the road. We are oiling streets in Portland in the residence district, and every one is pleased. The first expense is the only one."

It has been proposed to oil several blocks in the business section as an experiment, the cost of the same to be paid for by private subscription. The territory includes about six or seven blocks. The cost will be about \$200. The oiling company guarantees that they will put the streets in shape so that there will be no annoyance from dust during the balance of the season. It is intended as an experiment. If it is successful not only the business section but the streets in the residence portions of the city will be treated to a coat of oil. From the experience gained in the dust laden parts of California it appears that the oiling of streets, instead of sprinkling, is the proper way to escape the always flying dust of the dry season.

A Correction.

Manager Hickson of the Pacific States Telephone Co. informs The Review that it was in error when it stated the rates paid by his company for license and taxes in Portland. The Review stated the company paid \$75 per month as license in addition to a tax of \$1,000 a quarter or \$4,000 a year. Mr. Hickson says the license is \$50 per quarter and the tax \$1,000 a year, making a total of \$1,200 the company pays the city of Portland. The Review has no intention of distorting the facts, and is pleased to make the correction.

To Water Users.

Water used through hose for sprinkling yards or sidewalks or washing porches or windows must be paid for in advance, and used only between the hours of 5 and 8 a. m. and 5 and 9 p. m. It must not be used for sprinkling streets. Anyone using water contrary to these rules, or wastefully, will be shut off without further notice. St. Johns Waterworks and Lighting Co., P. H.
