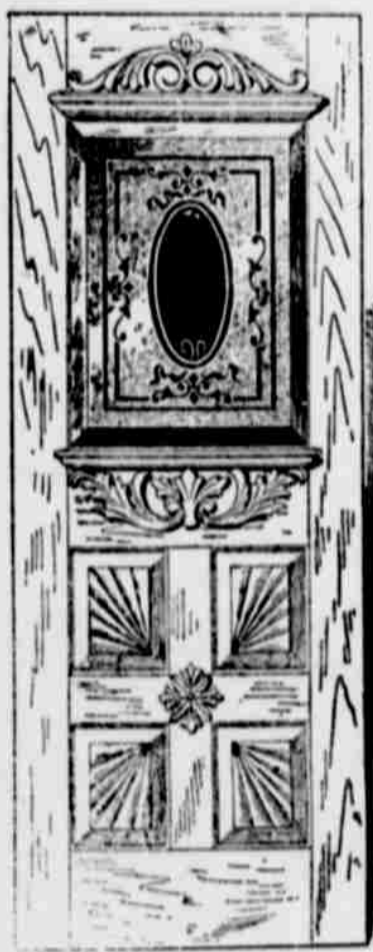

## Money in Chickens.

Mrs. Wheaton, who lives in Linn county, just across the river from this city, is pretty well convinced that there is money in chickens. She has 30 Brown Leghorn hens and from April 17th to August 1st she marketed 169 dozen eggs. At 18 cents per dozen the eggs brought Mrs. Wheaton \$30.42, or a little more than \$1 for each hen. This is pretty good for a scant three and a half months.—Corvallis Gazette.

Had this lady lived near this place with her chickens, she would have gotten at least 25 cents per dozen for her eggs, which would have made her receipts from the 30 chickens \$42.10, or at the rate of \$120 per year. Certainly money in chickens.

## GAME LAWS.

Brief Resume of Game Laws of the State of Oregon

It is lawful to kill buck deer in Oregon from Aug. 15 to Dec. 1. The season for does ends at the same time, but does not open until Sept. 1, at which time also it will be lawful to kill pheasants. The grouse season opened on the first of this month. It closes Dec. 1 as does the pheasant season. The open season for quail is from Sept. 1 to Dec. 1. Elks are protected until 1907. The season for trout, which opened April 1, closes Nov. 1.

The following brevities extracted from the Oregon game laws, will be of interest to sportsmen. It is unlawful to sell any game.

To kill more than ten pheasants, grouse or quail in one day.

To catch trout less than 5 inches in length.

To catch trout other than with hook and line.

To catch trout by night fishing.

To hunt deer by night.

To hunt deer with dogs.

To kill more than 5 deer in one season.

To hunt game animals or birds without license except on your own ground.

Black bass—No law. Snipe—No law.

## Answer This Question

Helix Herald: Who is making the money? That question arises when one sees the hundreds of head of beef cattle that are being shipped out of the country to different outside buyers and then has to pay 12 1/2 to 15 cents per pound for most any kind of meat, some pretty bum steaks at best. On Monday of this week 354 head of 2 and 3 year old steers and dry cows were shipped from Pendleton to the Fry Bruhn Co. of Seattle. Another shipment of 98 head was sent to the same parties Tuesday.

The price paid for the first lot was 3 cents per pound for steers and 2 to 10 per pound for dry cows. This lot of cattle was as fine looking beef stock as any one need to look at, every one in prime condition and only brought 3 cents per pound, while the same quality of meat, if it could be purchased at all in Pendleton, could not be bought for less than 12 1/2 to 15 cents. Who is getting this rakeoff. Not the stockman that is sure. It is understood there are over 2000 head of this grade of cattle all ready bought in the southern part of this country and the northern part of Grant, along the John Day's rivers. There must be a hitch somewhere that needs straightening out.

## English Walnuts at Hood River.

G. D. Woodworth planted 100 English walnuts which he received from Paris this spring and every one of the trees are growing nicely. This makes ten acres of English walnuts the greater part of which he imported the trees to plant, which Mr. Woodworth says is grown in the finest of shape. He says there is no reason why he may not raise as good or even better walnuts than are raised in California and he shows his faith in the crop by planting largely. On the same place, his Sunnyside farm, he has ten acres of Yellow Newtowns, which are also doing splendidly.—Hood River News Letter.

## Raising Tea in Oregon.

Henry Hedges, who has a ranch two miles east of Bend, recently imported some tea plants and they are doing well. These are said to be the first tea plants ever tried in Oregon. It is said that the climate of China, where tea is so extensively cultivated, is very similar to that of Central Oregon.—Jone Proclaimer.
