ORDINANCE NO. 129

Regulating the Construction, Erection, Enlargement, Raising, Alteration and Repair of Buildings, Providing for Fire Escapes and Exits, and Further Providing for the Issuance of Permits.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Every person, firm or corporation desiring to construct, erect, enlarge, raise, alter or materially repair any building within the corporate limit of the city of St. Johns, at a cost exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00), before beginning such work shall file with the city recorder a statement in writing containing a description in general terms of the building or work for which a permit is desired.

Section 2. Every building used or occupied or heretofore so constructed as to be used or occupied as a theater, hospital, asylum, seminary academy, college or school of any kind, hotel, rooming house, apartment house, tenement house, lodging house, or for factory, mill or manufactory, or for offices, workshops, or public entertainments or assemblies, shall have its doors of exit opening outward, and when of more than two stories in height shall be provided with one or more windows, or to as many windows of each story above the first as may be necessary to make and render said fire escapes readily accessible, safe and adequate for escape of the inmates in case of fire.

Section 3. Any person, firm, company or corporation that violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with, or that resists or opposes the execution of, or violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and every such person, firm, company or corporation shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for every day such violation, disobedience, neglect or refusal shall continue, and shall be punished accordingly.
