KILLED

B. a Fall From a Wharf Last Sunday

Ole Anton Olson, one of the sailors of the four-masted schooner Alpena, that had been loading lumber at the St. Johns Lumber Co.'s mill, fell from the dock to the deck of the vessel, a distance of thirty feet, about 6 o'clock last Sunday night, breaking his neck and badly mangling his body.

With several companions Olson came up town Sunday morning and went to Portland. He returned late in the afternoon considerably under the influence of liquor. In grouping his way along the wharf he lost his balance and fell. When picked up he was quite dead.

Olson shipped on the Alpena at San Francisco several weeks ago. He was well known along the coast, having been employed on coastwise boats for the past dozen years. He was a member of the Sailors' Union, who took charge of the body and gave it burial.

Olson was 46 years of age and unmarried. So far as known he has no relatives in this country.

At the inquest held by Coroner Finley a verdict was rendered that "Drink was the cause of death."

R. H. KEOGAN

Maimed for Life Under the Wheels of a Street Car.

While returning from his work on Willamette Heights, where he was employed by the Lefe Pence Co., R. H. Keogan of this city had his left leg horribly mangled and his right foot crushed last Saturday night about 6 o'clock. The injured man was at once conveyed to the Good Samaritan hospital, where the surgeons amputated his right foot. Although badly injured it is thought his left leg will be saved.

Mr. Keogan was waiting for an east-bound car, and while crossing the track was struck by a west-bound car, thrown to the ground and the wheels of the forward truck passed over him. The motorman applied the emergency brakes, dropped the fender and reversed the controller, but the momentum was too great to overcome, the car being only ten feet away.

Although receiving frightful injuries, and his condition has been critical, Mr. Keogan is expected to recover. He is married, and with his family has been a resident of St. Johns for over two years.

NEW BOAT

Being Built for the St. Johns Ferry Company

On the heavy plank driveway that leads from the ferry landing a new sidewheel boat is now being built for use of the ferry. A temporary shed has been erected so that work may continue without interruption. It is the intention to have the boat in commission by March 1. An expert boat builder is in charge of the work.

The new boat will have a carrying capacity for six teams on the lower deck. The passenger cabin will be on the upper deck. Both ends of the boat will be sharp, obviating the necessity of turning on each trip. It is the intention of the owners to build and equip the boat in first class style and to render up to date service.

In all probability a regular service will be established between St. Johns and Linnton. The company has been offered a landing place at the latter point, and have the proposition of making regular trips under considerations.

NEW HOME

For the West Coast Laundry on the Water Front.

A week from today the popular West Coast Laundry of this city will move into a home of its own at the foot of Pittsburg street near the ferry landing. The change is made on account of the demand for additional room to accommodate the new machinery to be installed.

The new laundry will be 60x110 feet with detached engine and ironing rooms. Although the work turned out by Mr. Johnson is unsurpassed, he is determined to improve his product by the addition of the latest improved machinery. Among the machines that will be installed will be a new \$1,500 mangle, a neck and wrist band ironer, a large washer, a shirt and collar starcher and a duplex body ironer.

It will require several days to get settled in the new location and the patrons are asked to be patient on the guarantee that better work than ever awaits them.

Will Soon Require Paving.

It is only a question of a very short time before a suitable pavement for Jersey street will have to be provided. Only a little over a year ago the street was treated to a heavy coat of gravel. Although this coat of gravel is about two feet thick, it is beginning to sink and break up. As at present treated the street will not stand heavy traffic. The chuck holes that are forming will prove a menace to teaming, and before another year a remedy will have to be provided to accommodate the traffic that is bound to increase.

Imp rtant Land Deals.

Things are looking up over Linnton way and since our last issue two important deals in water frontage have gone through. M. L. Holbrook, C. F. Sweigert and A. C. Campbell purchased 2,300 feet of water front, comprising 250 acres, for \$60,000, and a Portland syndicate purchased 2,700 feet along the deep water front for \$56,000. Both buys are between the road house and Linnton, and have excellent shipping facilities by rail and water. It is rumored that both properties are to be improved by the erection of manufacturing plants.

Proved a Paying Investment.

Last Monday M. L. Holbrook sold 50x90 feet and the building at the corner of Jersey and Tacoma streets, now occupied by The Louvre to J. Reid of Portland for \$10,000. The building is a one-story affair, and has five store rooms. The ground was purchased by Mr. Holbrook a little over two years ago for \$1,100, and at that time many of the supposed wise ones thought he had bought a gold brick.
