### COUNCIL

#### What Was Done at the Regular Meeting Tuesday Night

All members of the city council were in their seats when the mayor rapped for order at the regular meeting Tuesday night. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Ald. Norton, one of the members of the charter commission, informed the council that the labors of the commission would be completed in another meeting, and asked that the revised charter be typewritten, stating that it could be done for \$35 or \$40. The mayor and the speaker were empowered to have the work done.

The reports of the recorder and treasurer called for at the previous meeting were read and referred to the finance committee.

The condition of the sewer at the woolen mill was explained to the council by Ald. Hewitt and City Attorney Greene, and the matter was referred to the board of health with instructions to take immediate action.

Alderman Dobie stated that the platforms ordered built on Jersey street were completed, and warrants were ordered drawn for the payment of same.

Five bills of the St. John's Lumber Co., aggregating \$80.91 were allowed, and warrants ordered drawn.

A numerously signed petition for an arc light at Point View station and Allegheny street was referred to the light committee.

The condition of east Burlington street at its intersection with Jersey was the cause of considerable comment and discussion. By reason that the street is almost impassable and that tons of mud is carried on to Jersey street, on motion of Ald. Hewitt it was declared a nuisance and a barricade was ordered built to prevent teams from carrying additional mud on to the principal thoroughfare.

By a unanimous vote and at the request of ex-Alderman Leggett the impeachment proceeding, intended to have been instituted by the certain members of the former administration against ex-Mayor King and ex-Ald. Peterson were ordered expunged from the records. The measure was heartily indorsed by City Attorney Greene, who read a resolution with this end in view, and Ald. Norton, who gave voice to his opinion in a neat speech in favor of removing the stigma cast upon the gentlemen above named.

An amendment to Ordinance No. 130, defining the tax or licenses to be paid by the owners of vehicles in the city was lost by a vote of 4 to 3. In order to fix a scale to cover all vehicles the matter was laid over until the next meeting.

### J. W. HANKS

#### Passes Into the Great Beyond December 9th

J. W. Hanks, a well known resident of this city, died at his home December 9, 1906, aged about 63 years, after a lingering illness. Mr. Hanks was a prominent citizen and was formerly City Recorder of St. Johns. He was a native of Kentucky, but had spent the greater part of his life in the state of Missouri. Four years ago he came to St. Johns, where resided up to the time of his death. Mr. Hanks was respected by all who knew him as an honest, upright man. A kind husband and good father, he will be greatly missed in the home circle.

Deceased was a consistent member of the Cumberland Presbyterian church and was a faithful christian.

He leaves to mourn his death a widow, four children, one brother and three sisters. The brother who lives in North Dakota, and a sister from Missouri, were present when he breathed his last.

Brief funeral services were held at his home Monday, Dec. 10, by Rev. E. A. Leonard of the Baptist church, after which the remains were conveyed to the Lone Fir cemetery, Portland for interment.

#### At His Mother's Home at Salem Last Friday

Henry Daugherty of this city died at the home of his mother, Mrs. Myra A. White, in Salem last Friday morning, of a cancerous growth of the stomach. He had been ailing for some time, and went to his mother's home for treatment about a month ago. Deceased was well known in St. Johns as an upright industrious man, and his demise is regretted by all. Besides his wife he leaves three children, two little girls and a infant son three weeks old. Mr. Daugherty was a deaf mute as the result of an attack of diphtheria when he was quite young. His wife is also a deaf mute. The remains were buried at Salem. Deceased has a brother Louis F. Daugherty of Seattle and a half brother Elmo S. White of Salem.

#### Baptist Congregation Arranging to Erect New Edifice.
