IMPRESSED

With What He Saw at the Public Schools.

Ed. Review: I was very forcibly impressed in a visit of two hours to our public school, and my conception of educating the rising generation was intensified. Every one cannot be a principal of an institution of learning like this. Prof. Alderson must have acquired ability to meet the requirements. Upon him rests a great responsibility in the general management of such an institution. Then the necessity of competent teachers with personal individuality to care for their particular department under the general direction and dictation of the principal. I was attracted by the studiousness of the scholars and the effort put forth by the teachers to thoroughly rivet the lesson of the text books on their minds. A system in one room in the History lesson was to have scholars draw a map of the lesson. In another room the teacher used the object lesson on coffee production by giving each pupil grains of coffee to be used in the illustration.

In the primary department I was much interested in the phonic drill work, which is certainly an efficient plan to lay a lasting foundation to make the child independent in pronunciation.

The physical drill to exercise the entire body is of great advantage when the mind has a tendency to become weary. These exercises release the mind and bring the muscles into action, thus preparing them to take up the mental work again.

Another thing that attracted my attention was the unique system of controlling over 600 girls and boys in the march from the rooms to the separate basements, and then to the rooms, which I will not undertake to describe, but if any one wants to see a fine sight I would advise them to view this drill and march. It seemed almost perfect to me.

There is a special interest at present centered in the graduating class of the 8th grade. It has 20 pupils and will graduate Feb. 1 next, and will take the state examination Jan. 24 and 25. This will enlarge the high school to about 40 pupils. A new system will be taken up in the 7th, 8th and 9th grades, known as department work. In this system the teachers have charge of the same studies in all three grades. There is not room enough to take care of all the pupils at present, and it will be necessary to rent one or two rooms the first of the year. This denotes growth and demand.

I came away from the school with greater admiration and intensified interest and pride in the excellent system that had been introduced and maintained for the education of the children. If any are disposed to criticize or find fault with the school or faculty it would be well for them to visit and acquaint themselves with the above work. They will no doubt see many things in a different light than they have heretofore.
