BASE BALL

St. Johns Getting Ready to Open the Season March 31.

Plans for giving St. Johns a good article of base ball during the coming summer are progressing favorably. Pascal Hill is getting the grounds near his residence in shape, and when the gong sounds for play they will be second to none in the county.

Charlie Moore, the well known batting pitcher who played with the Portland Beavers last season, has been elected manager of the local club, and he has a string of players that will give St. Johns one of the strongest teams in the city league. Besides managing the club Moore will take his turn in the box.

The playing suits were ordered the first of the week, and are said to be the naggiest out. They are of blue trimmed with white, with the name "St. Johns" across the breast. On the sweaters the letters "S. J." will be displayed.

The grounds will be fenced and bleachers and a grand stand erected as soon as the lumber can be procured. On account of the strike in the mills there may be some delay in doing the work.

It is the intention to have a practice game next Sunday, and all players who wish to try for a place on the team are invited to leave their names with Secretary Frank Goodell at the Harris & Goodell cigar store on Jersey street.

Barring something unforeseen the club will open the season on the home ground Sunday afternoon, March 31. Who will oppose them in the initial game has not yet been decided upon, but due notice will be given later. It is the intention to advertise the opening of the season in St. Johns in royal style.

SHUT DOWN

St. Johns Lumber Co. and Veneer Works Closed.

Last Friday noon forty-one mill hands, members of the Order of Industrial Workers of the World, landed in St. Johns and proceeded at once to the large saw mill of the St. Johns Lumber Co. Their mission was to induce the workmen in the mill to quit work and join the strikers. The result was that they were successful in inducing a sufficient number to walk out so as to leave the mill in a badly crippled condition, and orders were issued to stop all work.

The demand for higher wages was made by the outside men. These men have been getting \$2.25 per day of ten hours, and ask for \$2.50 per day.

A number of strikers also visited the Portland Manufacturing Co. and called out the workmen. The men complied with the demand, and the mill closed down. The managers of the plant say they have no intention of granting the demands made upon them. They contend they had no differences with their men in regard to wages, and supposed everybody was satisfied until the walk out.

COUNCIL

What Was Done at the Meeting Tuesday Night.

The regular meeting of the council last Thursday night was one of the shortest of the year. All members were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The city attorney was directed to see that the abstract for the city hall property was brought down to the present time and to have the deed recorded.

A railing was ordered to be placed around the city dock.
Action on the plumbers' license was postponed until such time as the local plumbers can meet with the city attorney and assist him in drafting the same.

ORGANIZED

To Teach the Young Idea How to Legislate.

In order that the pupils in the public schools may become acquainted with the form of government and parliamentary rulings Prof. Alderson has organized them into a "city council" with regularly elected officers. The idea is gained from schools in the East, and this is the first attempt in the state of Oregon. That the plan is a good one and will be of great benefit all will admit. A great deal of knowledge that every one should know will be the result. Officers are to be elected three times during the year.
