BASE BALL

The Tri-City League of Base Ball Clubs Organized.

The officers of the semi-professional base ball clubs met in the Lumber Exchange in Portland last Saturday night and organized the Tri-City Base Ball League, and resolved to incorporate with a capital of \$500. The league will include clubs from Portland, Woodburn and St. Johns.

C. W. Glover has been elected manager for the Woodburn club and Charles Moore will act in the same capacity for St. Johns. Hugo Siebels and Joseph A. Stutt of Portland and D. Mangold of Woodburn were chosen as umpires. The clubs will use the Vaughn street grounds in Portland during the absence of the Beavers, while the Woodburn and St. Johns clubs have their own grounds. COUNCIL

What Was Done at the Meeting Tuesday Night.

The session of the council last Tuesday evening was productive and interesting throughout.

All members were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A petition signed by 32 tax payers asking that an itemized financial report of the city's business for the past year be prepared and published as provided by the city charter, was the cause of considerable discussion. The recorder explained that he had made several reports. Ald. Hewitt questioned the recorder at length, and insisted that an itemized report be made and published. City Attorney Greene read from the charter and made it clear that it provided for a report of the city's finances to be made semi-annually. Anticipating some action would be taken Recorder Thorn-dyke had prepared reports of the monies that have passed through his hands, and attempted to read them. Ald. Hewitt insisted on an itemized report. He did not question the honesty of the recorder, but the law as laid down in the charter had not been complied with. After the matter had been thoroughly threshed out the recorder was instructed to prepare and publish an itemized report.

A communication from C. L. Goodrich stating that he had been appointed administrator of his father's estate and asking that he be paid the balance of the architect's fees on the city hall building was received.

On motion of Ald. Hewitt it was laid on the table until certified copies of the administration papers could be presented and passed upon by the council.

A long communication was received from the Cement Produce Co. in regard to materials furnished Youngferdorf & Son and used in the construction of the city hall. On recommendation of City Attorney Greene no action was taken in regard to it.

The grading and improvements on Leavitt street were reported completed and accepted by the city engineer.

The recommendations from the Commercial club in regard to the placing of street signs was referred to the street committee.

The recorder asked for instructions in regard to the drawing of warrants in closing up the Leavitt streets improvements, particularly in the matter of paying the engineer's and publishing bills.

On motion of Ald. King, and seconded by Ald. Hewitt, the recorder was instructed to pay the printing bills out of the five per cent. awarded the engineer for his work.

The petition of L. Richard to build a roof garden at the corner of Jersey and Tacoma streets stated that the work would be done in a substantial manner and everything made fireproof. Referred to building committee.

The recorder was instructed to procure a sufficient number of regular and sample ballots for use at the city election on April 1, and to publish the complete ticket one time in The Review.

The petition for an arc light at the corner of Polk street and Willamette boulevard was rejected.

City Attorney Greene stated that he had examined the title to the city hall property and found it to be all right, but that an abstract should be furnished by a reliable abstract company. An abstract brought down to date, as recommended by the city attorney, was ordered.

A bill for \$780 for the chemical engine purchased last summer was presented. Laid over for one week.
