The mill men are taking advantage of the shut down caused by the strike by making necessary repairs.

The base ball boys will hold a practice game next Sunday on the home grounds providing the day is pleasant.

Three switch engines, two steam shovels and about fifty cars are employed at the cut across the peninsula for the Portland & Seattle railroad.

The cement basement walls of the new school house in North St. Johns are nearing completion, and material is being delivered on the ground daily.

Log rafts are being towed up the river and loaded at the mills by the steamers and when the strike is over all the mills will have a good supply of sawing material.

L. Richard yesterday filed a petition to place his name on the election ballot as a candidate for councilman at large. He will make the run as an independent candidate.

Ernest McDaniel, assistant electrician at the St. Johns power house had his foot badly crushed in an accident caused by a runaway car on the Russell-Shaver line on last Tuesday night.

What is known as the Caples tract of land in the southern part of the city is being cleared of its timber and underbrush, presumably with the intention of platting and placing it on the market in the near future.

D. C. Rogers & Co. report the sale of six lots on Jersey street during the past week at prices ranging from \$1,300 to \$4,000 each. Another Jersey street property will probably be sold by this firm today or tomorrow for \$11,000.

A large scow loaded with building materials was towed to the site of the new turpentine and alcohol plant on the opposite side of the river Wednesday. The work of excavating for the foundation is now in progress.

The Fairchild 12 acre tract at Newport station has been platted as Newton Addition and the lots are now for sale by the St. Johns Land Co. Prices ranging from \$300 to \$500 at the old terms—\$5 down and \$5 per month.

The charter commission will meet at the city hall this (Friday) evening to hear the report of the committee appointed to draft clauses providing for the registration of the voters in the city and the appointment of a police judge.

Chas. Limer returned Wednesday from a ten days' trip up Seattle way. In his estimation Portland and vicinity is miles ahead of Seattle. Tacoma and Bellingham in the matter of real estate values and business propositions. "In fact, we do not realize what a good thing we have here," said Mr. L.

Although the St. Johns Lumber Co.'s saw mill and the Portland Manufacturing Co.'s plant have been idle during the week by reason of the strike there has been no demonstration whatever by the strikers. As far as can be learned there have been no negotiations whatever looking towards a settlement.

Pascal Hill yesterday brought to The Review office several twigs containing almond blossoms. He has several almond trees on his place that are in full bloom. According to Mr. Hill the almond trees are the first to blossom, then come the apricots. These are followed by the peach, cherries and apples.

## FIRST ORDINANCE

Introduced by the St. Johns School City Council.

The first ordinance introduced at the first session of the St. Johns School City Council is as follows:

ORDINANCE No. 19—Introduced by Councilman Magone of the Second Ward.

An ordinance to regulate the number, term of office, and duties of Policemen.

The city council of the St. Johns school ordains as follows:

Section 1. The Police Commissioner shall appoint two policemen from each ward whose term of office shall be four weeks. He may appoint special policemen to maintain order at general or special elections.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of each policeman to assist his fellow citizens in the faithful observance of the laws; to arrest any person who persistently violates any law or ordinance of the city; to report such arrest to the police commissioner in such a manner as the latter may prescribe.

Section 3. Any policeman found guilty of willfully or persistently neglecting his duty shall be removed from office and denied the right of citizenship for ten weeks.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after its publication.

There is a deal on that, if consummated, will mean a great deal to St. Johns and vicinity. Those back of it are men of capital and business who are capable of making it a success. Whether their plans will mature depends on the price put on a certain piece of real estate close to St. Johns.
