By the result of the election the following bonds were authorized: \$3,000,000 of water bonds. \$1,000,000 of park and boulevard bonds. \$500,000 of dock bonds. The acts increasing the retail liquor license to \$800 and regulating the number of saloons also carried.

With the exception of mayor the entire Republican ticket was elected.
