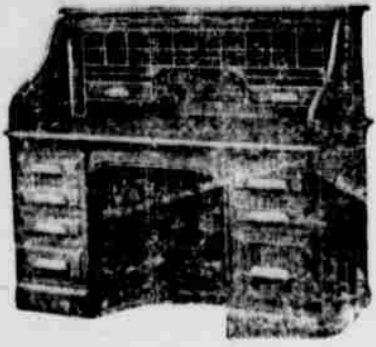

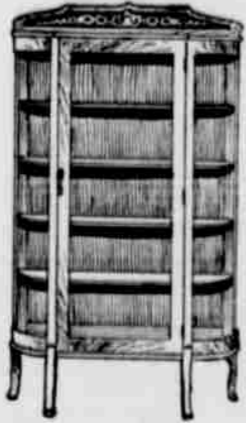

The recent moist weather made everybody forget about the dust nuisance. If anything is going to be done toward sprinkling or oiling the streets it should be taken up at once.

One of the hardest and heaviest rains of the season fell Tuesday afternoon. It was not local, but extended to the eastward giving the wheat fields a good soaking that will insure a bountiful harvest. The shower was probably among the last of the season, and the dry season will soon be here with its dust and kindred annoyances.

The steam barge Jim Butler caught fire at the Linton mill last Saturday, and in order to save the ship she was beached on this side of the river. The fire boat from Portland, a passing river steamer and the crews in the mills were engaged in preventing a spread of the flames. The boat was pumped out and floated Sunday. The damage was trifling, not exceeding \$500.

At their meeting last Monday night the local lodge of Odd Fellows closed a deal with Pascal Hill whereby they became the owner of the west half of lots 16 and 17, block 3, Hill's addition. These lots are purchased as a site for a new hall to be erected by the Order in the near future, and face on Pescenden street. It is Mr. Hill's intention to build in conjunction with the lodge, and the result will be a slightly block for the north end.

After a series of races between the Telephone and Chas. R. Spencer the former has been declared the fastest boat, and now carries the broom on her jack staff. From now on the Spencer will not attempt anything in the speed line beyond making schedule time. Albany Democrat: Fred Holmes, of across the Willamette, today sold to Sam Bugsby, of St. Johns, his team of sorrels for \$700 and they will go to St. Johns for the dry business. They weighed 2750 pounds. The manner in which the market is keeping up horses is very pleasant to the owners of good animals.

One of the features of Portland's celebration on the Fourth of July will be the illumination of the snow clad peaks of Hood, Helens and Adams. In addition to the regular display at the exposition grounds it is proposed to set off fireworks on the summits of the peaks that can be seen from Portland. The illuminations will all be fired at one time, and the sight will prove quite an attraction in itself.

As the result of the price of red and yellow fir logs falling from \$12 and \$13 per thousand to \$8 and \$9 ninety per cent of the lumber camps along the Columbia river will shut down until October 1 next. Over 600 men will be thrown out of work. The loggers say they have been obliged to pay their men from \$3 to \$5 per day, and with logs at present prices there is no money in continuing work.

It is not probable that St. Johns will be represented in the rose parade in Portland next week. An effort was made in this line, but when the cost was ascertained it was considered advisable to drop the matter. One who knows says it will cost anywhere from \$100 to \$500 to decorate an automobile and carry out the program as it should be. This sum was considered too large to squander, and so St. Johns will be without representation.

A series of fights that began about dusk last Sunday night on Jersey street ended several hours later in the arrest of three of the would-be pugilists and throwing them in the cooler. Later they furnished bail in the sum of \$10 each for their appearance, which was forfeited. It is said the gang was from Albina.

A mechanic recently from San Francisco advises all contemplating seeking work in the Bay City to stay away. While wages are high there are more than enough men to fill all the places. Again, there is a dearth of building material. As soon as a car load or several carloads of building material arrives enough men are put at work to use it all up in a couple of days. Then comes a long, tedious wait until the next lot is available. The unsettled condition of the labor market deters many from commencing building operations. 'Any mechanic,' said the man, 'can make more money anywhere outside of San Francisco at a couple of dollars a day less than he receives there.'

COUNCIL

What Was Done at the Meeting Tuesday Night.

The regular meeting of the city council was held in the city hall last Tuesday evening with all members present. The session was a long drawn out affair, lasting within a few minutes of midnight. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The St. Johns Transportation & Ferry Co. asked for and were granted an extension of time for twenty days to place their ferry boat in commission.

A petition was received from Knight & Glover asking for a renewal of their license to sell intoxicating liquors. Referred to the license committee.

A communication was received from C. L. Goodrich asking that he be allowed his commission of two per cent on the Crook & Walton contract on the city hall. Allowed.

A second communication from C. L. Goodrich asked the council to take up and consider the proposition looking towards the appointment of a building inspector. Laid on the table.

A third communication from C. L. Goodrich recommended the placing of an arc light at the corner of Philadelphia and Hayes street. Filed for future reference.

There were two bids for printing and binding the revised city charter, one from J. R. Rogers of Portland offering to do the work for \$248.50, and another from a firm at Kelso, Wash., for \$206.50. The Washington firm's bid being the lowest the contract was awarded to them at the above figures.

The bill of C. L. Goodrich, administrator of the estate of the late W. W. Goodrich, for ten per cent fees on the improvement of certain streets, came up and was given considerable discussion. It was referred to the finance committee for a final report.

The sum of \$100, the result of excess taxation, was ordered refunded to M. L. Holbrook.

The following bills were ordered paid out of the city hall fund:

A. D. McDonald asked for and was granted permission to enclose the frame building on the rear of his Jersey street lot with corrugated iron, and to enlarge and make the brick building already under way ten feet longer.

The matter of granting a gas franchise was discussed and action postponed until the next meeting when a representative of the James Steele company will be present to explain.
