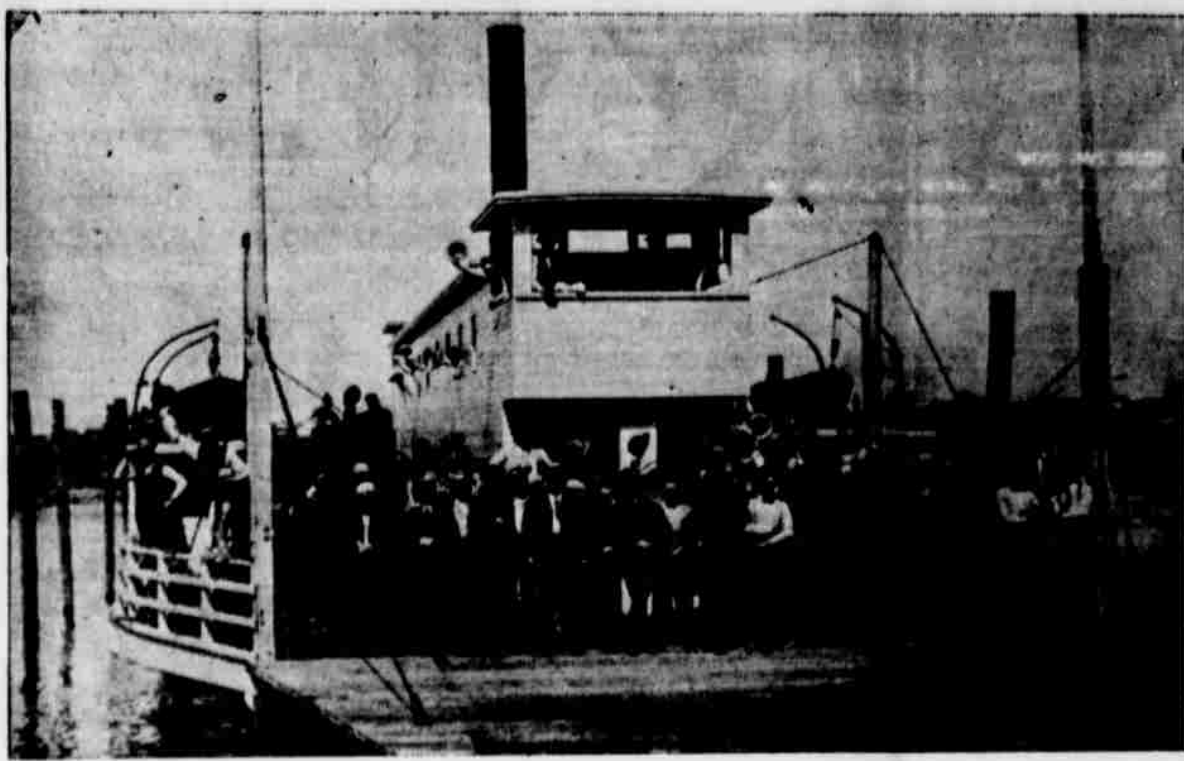

Mrs. Young is the mother of eight children, the youngest of whom was born when the eldest was still under seven years of age—there being three sets of twins. If our immortal Teddy had been president in those early days she most certainly would have been honored with a gold medal. We wish Mrs. Young could have been here to attend the pioneer meeting next week. Her story would have been an incentive to enthusiasm in the organizing of the society. She is certainly a pioneer par excellence, having spent the greater part of her life on the frontier, and is deserving of all honor for her work in helping to develop this great country of ours.

"Dad" Trine Is Dead.

To the hundreds of students all over the state, and elsewhere, who attended O. A. C. during the past four years, the above statement will cause a pang of genuine sadness, for there was scarcely an instructor who was more popular with the students than was "Dad" Trine. He was an enthusiastic athlete, thorough and scientific in his training, kindly and sympathetic in his intercourse with the pupils, and enjoyed their confidence to a very high degree.

He was 40 years of age, and leaves a widow and two little children. He has coached athletic teams in Monmouth, Willamette, Pacific University and O. A. C. Before he engaged in training he was a professional foot racer and his record for the 100-yard dash was 9.4 seconds; for the 220-yard dash, 22 seconds. He was hooked in the jaw by a cow about two years ago, which started a cancerous growth in the bone, resulting in his death. His wonderful grit and endurance kept him at work right up to the time of his decease, and no amount of physical suffering could conquer his spirit. The bereaved ones have the deepest sympathy of all his friends in the state.
