The locals managed to get four safe hits, one of which was a home run by Clark Moore, in the same length of time. The feature of the game was a triple play on the part of Kelso. From a fan standpoint a couple of poor plays were made by the locals. One of which was when Charlie Moore, the heaviest and surest batter on the team bunted the ball when two men were out and a runner on third. The other was when Brown failed to bunt with a man on first and second, thus permitting a triple play when he drove a liner to second base. Outside of these misplays the game was as good as could be expected when the condition of the grounds is taken into consideration. Two games were to have been pulled off, but this was found to be impossible. The score was 5 to 2, in the 'Tigers' favor.

COUNTY FAIR NEWS

Lively Time Promised at Gresham Next Month.

Everything is rushing in county fair matters and there is every prospect that the affair will be a wonderful success. At the last meeting of the board of directors the four days were divided up as follows:

Wednesday, Oct. 16—Opening day, public wedding and baby show. Crowning of queen and beginning of carnival.

Thursday, Oct. 17—Fraternal societies, grange and women's clubs.

Friday, Oct. 18—Portland day—judging of live stock and making awards.

Saturday, Oct. 19—Woodmen day, educational, university, collegiate, and carnival features in the evening.

The queen contest is now on in about fifteen places and all are doing something. Many merchants are giving a 5-cent vote with each dollar purchase, and some of the fraternal orders are out to win the honor of naming the queen.

A map of the grounds has been made, which shows the location of the pavilion and other buildings, and the concessions along the "Furrow," the name chosen for the amusement features. The "Furrow" promises to be a great attraction as it is announced that at least a dozen entertaining shows are after space.

Work has begun on the grounds and will soon commence on the buildings.

The horticultural display is going to be a great feature, as the exhibits will be mostly arranged out of doors. This work is in the hands of Dr. Louis Dechman, an experienced man in that line.

Premiums to the amount of \$1500 will be awarded. The list is now in the hands of the printer, and will be issued soon. Five thousand copies will be distributed.

The Multnomah County and Grange Fair and Carnival will be a great success.
