NEW PACKING PLANT

Reported to Have Purchased Tract near the Swif's.

Just when the Schwartzschild & Sulzberger Company will build its large packing plant in Portland neither J. S. Helsey, the company's general inspector for the Western states, nor E. A. Lundberg, attorney for the company, both of whom are registered at the Hotel Portland, would say yesterday, says the Oregonian. Other than to say that the articles of incorporation that have been filed are merely preliminary to the future operations of their company in this state, they declined to discuss the plans of the interest they represent. They refused to confirm the report that their company has purchased a site for its proposed packing plant on the peninsula near the site already selected by the Swif's.

The Schwartzschild & Sulzberger Company is the largest and wealthiest packing concern in the world, operating branch plants in London, New York, Chicago and Kansas City, while arrangements are being made for establishing another plant at Pueblo, Colo. It is known that this company has been investigating conditions for extending its business to the Pacific Coast, and has decided that Portland, by reason of its natural location and surroundings, is bound to be the livestock and packing center west of the Coast states. A large and constantly increasing interstate business has been transacted through-out the Pacific Northwest by this company, which will be enabled under its articles of incorporation to enter the state and engage directly in competition with the representatives of the beef trust.

In order to meet this competition it will be necessary for the new company to establish itself in this territory and do its own slaughtering.

Schwartzschild & Sulzberger are the only meat packers who have successfully fought the beef trust and their invasion of this territory is believed to have two purposes in its object—carrying the warfare into new fields and at the same time increasing the output of their plants, which is insufficient to meet the requirements of their growing trade. Portland, so closely located to the Eastern Oregon ranges, whose cattle have a reputation throughout the country, and affording the best of transportation facilities, has been selected by the company as the most desirable location for handling the Pacific Coast business.

Waning Hardwood Supply.

Although the demand for hardwood lumber is greater than ever before, the annual cut today is a billion feet less than it was seven years ago. In this time the whole sale price of the different classes of hardwood lumber advanced from 25 to 65 per cent. The cut of oak, which in 1899 was more than half the total cut of hardwoods, has fallen off 38 per cent, and elm has fallen off one-half.

The cut of softwoods is over four times that of hardwoods, yet it is doubtful if a shortage in the former would cause dismay in so many industries. The cooperage, furniture and vehicle industries depend upon hardwood timber, and the railroads, telephone and telegraph companies, agricultural implement manufacturers, and builders use it extensively.

This leads to the question, Where is the future supply of hardwoods to be found? The cut in Ohio and Indiana, which, seven years ago, led all other states, has fallen off one-half. Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, Tennessee, Texas, West Virginia and Wisconsin have also declined in hardwood production. The chief centers of production now lie in the Lake States, the lower Mississippi Valley and the Appalachian Mountains. Yet in the Lake States the presence of hardwoods is an almost certain indication of rich agricultural land, and when the hardwoods are cut the land is turned permanently to agricultural use. In Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi the production of hardwoods is clearly at its extreme height, and in Missouri and Texas it has already begun to decline.

The answer to the question, therefore, would seem to lie in the Appalachian Mountain. They contain the largest body of hardwood timber left in the United States. On them grow the greatest variety of tree species anywhere to be found. Protected from fire and reckless cutting, they produce the best kinds of timber, since their soil and climate combine to make heavy stands and rapid growth. Yet much of the Appalachian forest has been so damaged in the past that it will be years before it will again reach a high state of productivity. Twenty billion feet of hardwoods would be a conservative estimate of the annual productive capacity of the 75,000,000 acres of forest lands in the Appalachians if they were rightly managed. Until they are we can expect a shortage in hardwood timber.

Oregonian on Alaska.

S. B. Fay, formerly of the Willamette valley, but now of Hood River, returned from a trip to Alaska about ten days since and reports a fine time in the land of the midnight sun. Mr. Fay is an enthusiastic horticulturist and an expert in his line. He says he saw an apple tree at Ketchikan, Alaska, six inches in diameter, but which he was told had never borne fruit and there were no fruit buds on the tree at the time he saw it, but at Sitka he saw some cherry trees as fine as he ever saw anywhere and which were abundantly supplied with fruit buds.

He took a trip up the railroad to the top of the pass over the mountain where in 20 miles the rise is 3000 feet and the fare is 20 cents per mile. That would make an Iowa turn over in his grave. There the fare is 2 cents a mile. Mr. Fay says it is well worth the price, however. You can stand on the pass and see at the same time the source of two rivers, the Skagway, which empties into salt water, 20 miles from its source and the Yukon, which meanders 2600 miles among the Alaskan mountains before finding its exit into the ocean. Mr. Fay was not very badly captivated by the country of Alaska, though, and thinks Hood River a better place to live even if they do have to gather their gold nuggets from their apple trees instead of out of mother earth.
