SUMMONS.

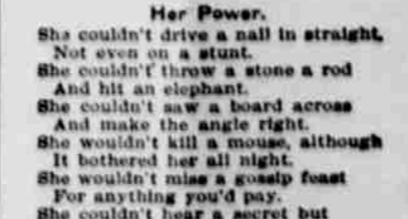
IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, COUNTY OF MULTNOMAH:
