Council Proceedings.

The city fathers met in their 40th assembly Tuesday evening all being present except Peterson who was absent on leave.

A petition was presented asking for an arc light at the intersection of Depot and Oswego streets. Referred to the water and light committee.

Petition signed by 17 property owners asking for the improvement of Oswego street between Portland boulevard and the north line of Barton's addition was referred to the city engineer.

Communication of Mr. Ferrell asking that the water company be made to furnish him with water referred to water and light committee.

Offer of Howe & Son to guarantee the road working machinery read and placed on file.

Attorney Ryan was here permitted to present ordinance vacating that portion of Albady street covered by the Portland Manufacturing company to which they had not as yet acquired a title. This passed the council and is published this week in the Review. This is done at the expense of the manufacturing company.

The rock committee reported that they could secure the acre and half of rock offered the city last week for \$1200 cash. The committee was continued another week.

Alderman Jobs reported that the property rights of adjacent owners, according to United States Engineer Hedley extend to the harbor line at the point where it is proposed to erect the city dock.

City Attorney Greene reported that the rights of the O. R. & N. on Bradford street simply consisted of an easement and right to operate their track, that they had no vested rights on the street. Upon this finding the street committee was instructed to confer with the St. Johns lumber company upon the subject of proper rental for the use of St. Johns street now being occupied from Bradford street to the river.

In the matter of street improvements, bids were received as follows: Two each on Tacoma and Philadelphia and one on Polk. Bid of M. E. Swan for Tacoma was accepted, being \$22 less than that of his competitor, and L. D. Jackson's bid was accepted on Philadelphia, his bid being \$20 less than that of his competitor. The contract for the improvement of Polk from the Willamette boulevard to the north line of St. Johns Heights at 49 cents for cut, 25 cents for fill and 49 cents per lineal foot for walk was awarded to L. D. Jackson.

Resolution bringing the bond issue to a vote of the people in the matter of city dock and site for the same passed the council and appears in this issue as does another resolution enlarging the boundary of the city limits for the same purpose.

The building committee and city engineer were instructed to put in a cement walk leading from the south steps of the city hall to the sidewalk on Burlington street. The matter of the opening of Richmond street was laid over another week.

Bills to the amount of \$180.10 were allowed.
