### COMMUNICATED.

Editor Review: Regarding a communication from P. Hill last week complaining of his failure to get Fessenden improved at the hands of the city council would like to say that the matter is quite complicated; because in the first place the railway company owns a strip of land 30 feet wide in the center of where the street ought to be; that is private property, not a street; also on the inside the loop, from Jersey street east to Charles street along the car track is acre property also not dedicated to the public, consequently Fessenden street from Jersey to Charleston is only 15 feet wide and in front of Mr. Maples' place there is no street at all; and further, from Lively street to Smith's crossing the railway company owns its 30 foot right of way by virtue of a deed from P. T. Smith, "as long as used for railway purposes." Now before the city council can order Fessenden street improved it will be necessary to have all the 30 foot right of way and also 15 feet along the unplatted acre property dedicated to the public for a street. If Mr. Hill had attended to these little details before he presented his petition for improvements he might have had better success. I wish to assure him that the good government league are in favor of street improvements which he can readily see if he will read its platform, and I will further assure him that if the council and city attorney nominated by the good government league are elected they will find a way to make a street where Fessenden street ought to be but ain't. ### NOTICE OF CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on Monday, the 6th day of April, 1908, in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, for the following purposes, to-wit: for the approval or rejection of the proposed annexation of the following named officers for the said City for the ensuing year, viz: one Mayor; one City Recorder; one City Attorney; one City Treasurer; three councilmen at large; two councilmen from the First Ward; two councilmen from the Second Ward in the manner provided by law and the Charter of said City.

And at said election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of said City for their approval or rejection the following proposition: "Shall the City of St. Johns incur a municipal bonded indebtedness in the sum of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00), twenty-three thousand five hundred dollars (\$23,500.00) of which shall be for the purpose of purchasing river front lots three (3), four (4), five (5) and six (6) James Johns Addition, sometimes known as James Johns First Addition, to the City of St. Johns, Multnomah county, State of Oregon, for public dock purposes; and thirty-six thousand five hundred dollars (\$36,500.00) of which shall be for the purpose of erecting, building and constructing a public park, to-wit: for City purposes. Said bonds to run for a term of twenty (20) years from their date, and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and interest coupons to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum after maturity."

And at said election there will also be submitted to the qualified electors of said City for their approval or rejection the following proposition, viz: "Shall the City of St. Johns incur municipal bonded indebtedness in the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.00) for the purchase of a public park, the description of which real property for said park purposes is as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of the westerly line of Cook street with the northerly line of that certain right of way of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, described by deed dated July 24, 1901, and recorded on December 19, 1901, at page 321 of book 282, Records of Deeds of the county of Multnomah, state of Oregon; thence northerly along the westerly line of said Cook street to the southerly line of Crawford street, in A. L. Miner's addition, in said county and state; thence westerly along the southerly line of said Crawford street to a point which would be in the center of Polk street, if extended; thence southerly along the center line of said Polk street, extended, to a point in the center of Bradford street, extended; thence westerly along the center line of said Bradford street, extended, to the easterly line of Tyler street; thence southerly along the easterly line of said Tyler street to the northerly line of said Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company's right of way aforesaid; thence easterly along the north line of said right of way to the place of beginning; excepting from said described parcel of land a strip thereof located to the Port of Portland upon which is situated their power house. Also the following described property in A. L.
