In the matter of bonds the following amounts were assigned to the different officers: Treasurer, 10,000; recorder, \$5,000; engineer, \$3,000; all policemen regularly em-ployed, \$1,000 each. These amounts were deemed sufficient for the present; when heavy operations are entered into such as the handling of the funds for the city dock and street improvements the bonds of the recorder could then be raised by ordinance.

On motion of Dobie city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance fixing the bonds as above.
