Elect Principals for Next Year

At their meeting Monday night the school board elected principals for the city schools for the coming year.

For the high school Miss Clara A. Boss was unanimously elected to succeed herself. Miss Boss has made a most admirable record in opening and placing the new school on a good footing. It will be remembered that the building was not fully completed when the High school was opened, yet with consummate skill Miss Boss marshaled her forces, segregated her pupils, assigned her assistants to the different rooms and had the entire bunch moving off within the first thirty days with the regularity and precision of an old, established school. In the matter of bonds the following amounts were assigned to the different officers: Treasurer, \$10,000; recorder, \$5,000; engineer, \$3,000; all policemen regularly employed, \$1,000 each. These amounts were deemed sufficient for the present; when heavy operations are entered into such as the handling of the funds for the city dock and street improvements the bonds of the recorder could then be raised by ordinance.

On motion of Dobbie city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance fixing the bonds as above.

The improvement of a section of Kellogg street was referred to the street committee on motion of Davis.

The improvement of Oswego street was referred back to the committee and city engineer on motion of Dobbie.

Ordinance fixing bonds was railroaded through to passage.

Engineer's acceptance of work on Polk street was adopted on motion of Dobbie, the same on Tacoma and warrants were to be drawn for the several amounts involved in the improvements when the work was finally accepted by the street committee.

The matter of the improvement of Philadelphia between Ivanhoe and Hayes streets was referred to the street committee to report at the next meeting on motion of Dobbie.

On motion of Hunter, the chairman of each committee was required to report to the council all the tools, appurtenances, etc., in his hand belonging to the city, this also including the officers.

On motion of Davis the fire chief was required to make a report once a month showing all the material and machinery of the fire department in his hands and condition of the same.

On motion of Dobbie the Recorder was authorized to purchase supplies for his office not to exceed \$50 for the year.

Adjourned.

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ORDINANCE NO. 172

Appropriating Money to Buy Property for Rock Quarry Purposes.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

That there shall be, and hereby is appropriated out of the general fund the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1200.00) for the purchase of property for rock quarry purposes, to be expended under the direct supervision of the council and in accordance with the charter and ordinances of said city and resolutions of council in accordance therewith.

ORDINANCE NO. 173

An Ordinance Fixing the Bonds of

City Treasurer, City Recorder, Police Officers and City Engineer of the City of St. Johns, Oregon.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

Section 1. The bond of the City Treasurer of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars.

Section 2. The bond of City Recorder of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars.

Section 3. The bond of Chief of Police and Night Police of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for each regular officer.

Section 4. The bond of the City Engineer of the city of St. Johns is hereby fixed at three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars.
