Here's to you Hood River County. May there be no limit to your prosperity, nor end of days until Gabriel blows his horn on the morning of the last great day, and may you have a good, clean record to bring up with you.

It will take Banker Ross 790 years in prison to serve out his fine at \$2 per day, it is said. Maybe by that time he will have acquired sense enough to play a square game the rest of his days. Let's put him in and get him to doing service, so as to get the job off as early as possible.

Just take a squint at the list of building permits in another column. We did not have room for them in last week's issue and have two weeks' issue in one. The showing does not indicate a very severe stringency in money matters. We will put St. Johns up against anything of her size for improvements and prosperity.

If the boys in St. Johns who have been in the habit of spending \$15 or \$20 a month for booze will deposit that amount in the bank every month for the next two years and never drink a drop of joy water during that time, we will guarantee them a better time, more money, better friends, more of them and that they will never again resort to the jug shops for amusement thereafter.

The St. Johns float attracted considerable attention among those of the parade and was termed the "New revelation from the modern Patmos by a St. Johns dreamer." Just you wait 15 or 20 years and you will see a fulfillment of the prophecy to the letter. We are in the procession and riding in the first car; and there are no black plumes on the horses, either.

How is this, you say you are a church member and voted for the saloon? Well, that skins me. We do not blame a man who does not believe in God, man or the devil so much if he votes for the saloon, but a man who professes to be a follower of Jesus Christ and will then vote for the saloon would out-judas Iscariot. We believe that there are some of that kind of people in St. Johns or there would have been a bigger dry vote. It will be more tolerable in the day of judgment for Sodom and Gomorrah than for such voters, or we do not read our Bible right.

A petition is being circulated and being almost universally signed by the citizens of St. Johns, the object of the petition being to place Mr. Tom Robison on the ballot as a candidate for director before the school meeting to be held on the 15th. Almost everybody knows Tom Robison, and we do not believe anyone knows anything detrimental to his good name. We have known him every since we came to St. Johns and have found him to be a first-class citizen, a good friend, and we believe he will make a number 1 school director if elected. We hope every voter in the city will give him a vote.

Did you vote Monday? No! Well, you are a dandy! Why, they will not let a horse thief vote, and you place yourself on a level with a horse thief! You know that you are better than a horse thief! Now don't ever neglect to exercise your right of suffrage, for when you do you put yourself politically on a level with the convict. We would rather see a man come to the polls and vote against our candidate than to not come at all. There is some hope for a man who will come to the polls and vote, but the man who is so indifferent that he will not come out and vote is dead on his feet and should be buried.

Yes, the town has gone dry, but we have not got much to crow over. Had to get University Park to help us. We believe that if St. Johns had made the fight alone we would have gone dry with a bigger vote than we did Monday. This can be done if all will work together for the advancement and prosperity of the city. Let us lay aside all personal animosity that may be harbored at present against anyone in the city and push shoulder to shoulder for the best interests of all.

Council Meeting.

At the adjourned meeting of the council held Wednesday evening all were present. A petition signed by some 100 of the citizens and freeholders, asking for a free ferry at St. Johns, was presented, read and placed on file.

Petition for the improvement of Learned street was referred to the street committee for investigation. Communication from Superintendent Fuller stated that lights at St. John Heights would be repaired at once.

Liquor license of Ed Magoon was granted subject to the result of the election.

Rock crusher bills to the amount of \$42.50 for labor; for advertising bonds in New York paper, \$19.50; Hendricks Hardware Co., for supplies, \$42.39 and H. King for labor \$1.25, were allowed.

On motion of Hunter it was decided to audit bills for labor on the first and third meetings in the month and on all other bills on the first meeting of the month only. Persons having claims against the city will save themselves annoyance if they will remember this.

Resolution covering the plans and specifications for the improvement of Oswego street was adopted on motion of Johnson.

Resolution in condemnation proceedings for the widening of Willis Boulevard appointing appraisers S. C. Cook, B. T. Leggett and S. C. Norton passed the council.

Ordinance for the improvement of Richmond street passed the council.

Fire-cracker ordinance laid on table for a week on motion of Johnson.

Ordinance prohibiting the selling or giving of liquor to minors laid on table for a week on motion of Hunter.

This ordinance we believe should be passed by all means, for the reason that making it a state offense instead of taking action under the city laws, all the fines go to the state, whereas if there is a city law all the fines accrue to the city, and give greater force to the law because of its being a local matter instead of general.

City Attorney Collier presented written report stating that the city could not recover in their suit against the bondsmen for Youngferdord and that they need not have paid the Youngferdord claims and that the city was short just that much money.

Upon request of a number of citizens, Captain Black asked for the appointment of a new special officer for the ball grounds.

On motion of Hunter, the rock crusher was ordered placed at the head of the canyon under the supervision of the city engineer.

Allen R. Jobs was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Alderman Tyron upon the first ballot, the vote being unanimous.

The garbage chestnut came up again and the council roared us up calling it a chestnut, declaring that it was no laughing matter, if we did laugh. They certainly have our sympathy.

School Meeting.

In another column will be found a call for the annual school election to be held June 15th, at which time it will be decided whether or not we will have the 11th and 12th grades taught in the public schools of St. Johns.

We most certainly do not wish to be considered back numbers in education any more than in any other department of life. We would all consider it an insult to be called antiquated, out of date, behind the times. Yet if we vote to have but a two, instead of a four year high school course, and teach here only the 9th and 10th grades of high school work, we would brand ourselves in the eyes of the whole state of Oregon, as well as the other western states, as being all that, and more too.

Even little Hood River, with little more than half the population of St. Johns, has her full four year course.

If we have the four year course we will keep our young people at home, the money incident to their acquiring an education will be spent in St. Johns instead of going to Portland and to the street car company. At home there will be two hours more every day for study or recreation than when the pupils are obliged to ride to and from the city. There is less danger of accident, less opportunity for exposure and consequent sickness. We all know what the cars are during a great part of the fall and spring months, when it is too warm for the heaters and too cold to run without them. We all know the great number of cases where a severe cold, fever, even pneumonia resulted from these rides. It certainly will be cheaper for us to keep the youngsters at home, where they can be comfortable, where we can be with them, help them, enjoy their company as much as possible before they leave us for good; than to be obliged to send them to Portland two years (before they go to college) where they will be away from us all day, where we may know nothing of their companions, where the expense is double what it would be at home, where everything is against their best interest and nothing to be gained.

Let us all turn out and vote for a full four year course to be taught here in St. Johns.

We Saw the Parade.

Yes, we went to Portland yesterday to see the floral parade. It was great. You couldn't see the people for the crowds and they were all crazy to see, and the crazy was 'ketchin,' for the 'Queen of the Canibal Islands' had not more than arrived where we stood, when we came to, and found ourselves hanging on the ragged edge of the crowd with our eyeballs and holding somebody's little boy on our shoulder, that we found crying because he couldn't look any way but up. It was a glorious spectacle. There were wagons of roses and peaches of girls; beautiful horses with bifurcated women riding them; Teddy bears, O. A. C. cadets and other animals. There were three bands: the Oregon Journal silver cornet band, a band of cowboys and a fakir band selling yesterday's photographs of the parade made last summer; toy balloons, and whistles. Occasionally one of the little airships would slip out of an urchin's hand, and it was a whole barrel of fun to see the little fellow try to shin up a sunbeam after it as it floated gracefully over the skyscrapers. If the balloon had a phonograph attachment to it the angels would receive some funny records when it gets through.

The land of the rising sun had one of the finest floats in the parade and the little brown men seemed to enter into the spirit of the occasion with as much zest as did the Americans. The Yellow Dragon also had representatives in the procession.

There was the biggest crowd in the city we have ever seen there. The congestion of people at Third and Morrison was terrific. People were lifted from their feet by the press, and Morrison from Tenth street to the bridge was an unbroken sea of heads. We are told that many other streets were equally crowded, and during the parade the carservice on these streets was as effectually blocked as if it had been struck by a Dakota blizzard.

RESOLUTION.

It is resolved by the city of St. Johns: That S. C. Cook, B. T. Leggett and S. C. Norton, three disinterested freeholders of the city of St. Johns, and possessing the qualifications to serve the circuit of Multnomah county, Oregon, be and they are hereby appointed to view the proposed change and alteration of Willis Boulevard in said city, to-wit: Beginning at the northwest corner of lot 10 in Hill's addition to the city of St. Johns; thence south 35 degrees east 177.5 feet to the westerly side line of Fessenden street; thence north 56 degrees, east 30 feet; thence south 56 degrees, west 177.5 feet; thence south 56 degrees, west 30 feet to the place of beginning and make assessments of damages and benefits, and determine how much, if any, less valuable the land or other property or any part thereof, through or over which the proposed boulevard, as changed, will be rendered thereby, and shall ascertain the respective interest of all persons claiming to be owners of said lands or other property or improvements thereon, or to have any interest in such lands or improvements, the damages which any said owners respectively will sustain. Said viewers shall also make a just and equitable assessment of the value of the benefits and advantages of said proposed change to the respective owners or other persons interested in said land or other property which said viewers shall deem specially benefited by such proposed change, and shall thereafter at their earliest convenience, report the assessment of the damage and the benefits to said property owners to the council. Which said viewers shall receive as compensation for their services the sum of \$2.00 a day for each day actually engaged in said service and shall assess said cost as part of the benefits to said property.

That the office of the city recorder in the city hall in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, be and the 10th day of June, 1908, at 10 o'clock a. m. of said day the time when and where said viewers shall meet and then and there be sworn to faithfully discharge the duties assigned them, or on any subsequent day to which they may adjourn, (which adjournment shall not exceed one week at any one time) proceed to view the proposed change and assess benefits and damages aforesaid.

That the city recorder shall send by mail, post paid a notice of the appointment of said viewers, their names and the time and place for meeting and specify with convenient certainty the boundaries and terms of said proposed change of said Willis Boulevard to each of the property owners whose property is proposed to be appropriated or to the agent of such, if the postoffice address of such owner, agent or agents is known to him, and if such postoffice address is unknown to said recorder, then to such owner or agent at St. Johns, Oregon.

That the said city recorder shall at least five days before the day set for such meeting, cause said viewers to be notified of their appointment, and the time and place of such meeting, and shall swear each of said viewers, before entering upon the discharge of their said duties, to faithfully and impartially discharge the duties assigned to them.

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ORDINANCE NO. 178

An Ordinance Assessing the Cost of Improving Richmond Street, from the Southerly Line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly Line of Willis Boulevard in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Directing an Entry of Such Assessment in the Docket of the City Liens.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows: The City Council of St. Johns having ascertained the cost of improving Richmond Street from the Southerly line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly line of Willis Boulevard in the City of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of Council of April 28, 1908, and of record in the office of the City Recorder of said City, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation at St. Johns, on the 1st and 8th days of May, 1908, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file; and the legal posting of notices of such street improvement as shown by affidavit of the City Engineer on file with the Recorder, and no remonstrance having been filed, and as provided by said resolution, the sum of \$2434.00 being said engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost, but to be more accurately determined by the City Engineer. The time within which said improvement is to be completed is hereby fixed at sixty days from the date of the last publication of notice for proposals for said work, which proposals must be filed with the Recorder of said City on or before the 23rd day of June, 1908, at four o'clock p. m. of said day.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved accordingly and that said Recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three insertions in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, inviting proposals for making said improvements and said sum as estimated by the City Engineer as costs thereof or such sum shall finally be fixed and determined by said City Engineer, not exceeding said sum, is hereby assessed to the lots, parts of lots and tracts of land in their several proportions in the said assessment district of said Richmond Street from the Southerly line of Portland Boulevard to the Northerly line of Willis Boulevard in the City of St. Johns, in the respective amounts to be hereafter determined and assessed to said lots, parts of lots and tracts of land abutting thereon, and adjacent thereto, and as being especially and particularly benefited by said street improvement of Richmond Street heretofore declared and now designated as all lots, parts of lots and tracts of land in the marginal lines of said Richmond Street back to the center of the blocks or parts of blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or adjacent or approximate thereto on either side of said street.

That the property included in said improvement district as aforesaid is hereby declared to be local improvement district No. 4.

The City Recorder is hereby directed to enter at the proper time the said assessment heretofore determined and assessed to said City and cause notices to be published as provided by law and the City Charter of said City of St. Johns, and that said assessment be apportioned as in the Charter of said City directed.

RESOLUTION

Resolved, that the Council of the city of St. Johns deems it expedient and necessary to improve Oswego Street from the North line of Portland Boulevard to the North line of Barton Addition, in the following manner:

By grading the same to the established grade and sidewalk 12 foot curb, 6 foot walk with such timbers and stringers as have been adopted by the council of the City of St. Johns, together with regulation cross walks, and by graveling a strip 10 feet wide in the center of said street, according to the estimates, plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Recorder, relative thereto.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the said city of St. Johns, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the city engineer, filed in the office of the city recorder of the city of St. Johns, which said plans, specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all the property (land) between the termini of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent to or approximate to said Oswego Street, from the margin line of said street from back to the center of the block or blocks abutting thereon or adjacent or approximate thereto.

That all of the property included in the said improvement district as aforesaid, is hereby declared to be Local District No. 5.

The said city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Oswego street is \$4185.58. The cost of said improvement of said Oswego street to be assessed against the property in said local assessment district, provided by the city charter of the city of St. Johns.
