Said viewers shall also make a just and equitable assessment of the value of the benefits and advantages of said proposed change to the respective owners or other persons interested in said land or other property which said viewers shall deem specially benefited by such proposed change, and shall thereon, at their earliest convenience, report the assessment of the damage and the benefits to said property owners to the council. Which said viewers shall receive as compensation for their services the sum of \$25.00 each, to be paid by the city of St. Johns, and shall assess said cost as part of the benefits to said property.

That the office of the city recorder in the city hall in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, be the place, at their earliest convenience, report the assessment of the damage and the benefits to said property owners to the council. Which said viewers shall receive as compensation for their services the sum of \$25.00 each, to be paid by the city of St. Johns, and shall assess said cost as part of the benefits to said property.
