The generator ran so fast that it flew to pieces. A hunk of casting struck the governor of the other big wheel breaking it and the other gate flew open and that generator also followed the first. The total damage is estimated at \$100,000. There was no loss of life, but the two operators there had a narrow escape from the flying metal. The building shows a great pile of castings and twisted wire as though the plant had been torn to pieces by some great explosion.
